Advance Census Report Forms Being Distributed Across North Carolina

Advance Report Forms for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by Post Office employees this week to all households in this area. District Supervisor, Samuel E. Rouse, announced today.

The Advance Report Form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit. The district supervisor urges all residents to fill out the form and have it ready for their rounds on April 1.

The Advance Report Form contains seven questions about every person in the household and six questions about the household's dwelling. The household information asked for is name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is the number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, and whether rented or owned.

At every fourth household, the census taker will leave a Census Household Questionnaire which contains additional questions covering population and housing characteristics, which are being asked of a 25 percent sample of the Nation's population. Householders are requested to fill out the household questionnaire and mail it within three days to the local census district office. A pre-addressed, postage free envelope is being provided for this purpose.

The "sample" population questions include inquiries on country of birth, mother tongues of foreign born, schooling, employment, income and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Fed. law only statistical totals & averages are published in published reports and census publication, investigation, or taxation.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Anyone who doubts that the bureaucratic mind reaches a point where it holds itself superior to the Congress should carefully read the just published report of the hearing held by a subcommittee of the Senate Small Business Committee on the Federal Trade Commission's interim report on mergers and unfair competition in food marketing.

Sen. Hubert Humphrey heads the subcommittee.

C. W. Harder, Flanked by various functionaries, Earl Kintner, FTC chairman, appeared.

Kintner has perhaps created more personal publicity for himself than any person to ever serve on the FTC through his inconsequential disc jockey probe. Presumably he will go down in history as the Don Quixote of Tin Pan Alley.

In 1958 Senate Small Business Committee requested FTC to study in food retailing.

FTC dilly-dallied finally releasing major press release on an "interim" report just before appearing before committee.

Sen. Humphrey did not appreciate this procedure at all. In fact, he told FTC Chairman Kintner, "The Federal Trade Commission is not an executive agency. Your responsibility is that of a quasi-judicial or quasi-independent regulatory body established by Congress. The Senate Small Business Committee made a request to the FTC for this investigation. . . . I don't like the fact that an agency, an independent agency, that is fulfilling the request of a duly constituted body of the elected representatives of the people ignores the request of Congress."

In defense for delay in complying with the request of Congress the FTC introduced a resolution it had adopted initiating a study into the economic abuses in the food industry.

Senator Humphrey then said, "I merely want to be sure we are not going to content ourselves with some more of these spurious platitudes. "Whereas" sections of resolutions are just about as worthwhile as fluff in the sky. And many people "whereas" themselves to death in the hopes that somehow this will appease the people who are injured or claiming injury."

The Senator then pointed out that the FTC resolution rather ignored instructions to probe into collusive pricing. Kintner replied he and his four colleagues would give it prayerful consideration.

Senator Humphrey replied "I do not want a prayerful consideration, because this resolution says nothing about prayer in it. It speaks of action."

The full report makes appalling reading for anyone who believes in the Constitution.

It is generally forgotten Russia, after Czar's overthrow, freely elected in 1917 a democratic Duma, or Congress. But a small corps of Bolsheviks, by issuing orders, by ignoring the Duma, took over control. Probably as never before, U. S. needs support of the people if representative government is not to be replaced by bureaucratic rule.
