Preparations Being Made For Lost Colony's 20th Year

Manteo, N. C. - Under the direction of General Manager J. Sid Dorton, work is now underway here for the 20th season opening of Paul Green's symphonic drama The Lost Colony. The show this year will begin on June 25 and be presented nightly, except Mondays, through September 4.

One of the major jobs to be accomplished prior to the early June rehearsals of The Lost Colony this year is to repair Waterside Theatre at Fort Raleigh National Historic Site on Roanoke Island where the drama is presented each summer on the exact historical locations of many scenes from the show. This reconstruction work is under the direction of Albert Q. Bell of Manteo who was the builder of the theatre in 1937 when the drama was first presented.

First auditions for Lost Colony actors to be in the cast this year were in Chapel Hill last Saturday (3-26-66) with Director Clifton Britton, Music Director George Troutwein and Choreographer present to assist General Manager Dorton. The Chapel Hill troups were held in the Playmakers Forest Theatre of the University of North Carolina.

Dorton has planned one of the most intensive promotional programs in The Lost Colony's history prior to opening of the show this year, in June. The new manager of the Paul Green drama is a native Shelby, N. C. his previous show business and promotional experience has included management of Southern States Fair in Charlotte for several years and managing director of the Brevard Music Festival in western North Carolina last year.
