## K. P. C. A. Elected To Membership In American Institute Of Cooperation

The Kenansville Production Credit Association of Kenansville, North Carolina, was unanimously elected to membership in the American Institute of Cooperation, the national educational and research agency for farm business organizations, at the A. I. C. annual meeting at the University of California, Berkeley, according to an announcement by J. K. Stern, Institute President. The A. I. C. is chartered as a University in the District of Columbia and meets each August at a Land-Grant College.

Officers and directors of the Kenansville Production Credit Assn. have been invited to participate in educational activities of the institute and to attend the 1961 meeting at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis - St. Paul, August 20-23. This is the largest annual conference on farm business problems and draws over 2,000 farm business leaders, university and government, farm and marketing specialists, farm credit men, and rural educational workers, including 1,200 rural members of youth organizations and young farmers.

## Kennedy And Johnson Unmask Nixon's "Benson Approach" To Agriculture

Democratic nominee Kennedy spotlighted the Bensonite character of Nixon's proposals when, in the first of the nationwide TV debate series from Chicago, he said:

"I think Mr. Benson's program has failed and I must say, after reading the Vice President's speech to the farmers, as he read mine, I don't believe it is very much different from Mr. Benson's."

"I don't think it provides effective government controls. I think the support prices are tied to the average market price for the last three years, which was Mr. Benson's — (CONTINUED ON SOCIETY)"

## Need Salad Vegetables

The Duval Prepackaging Company of Raleigh, is interested in purchasing some salad vegetables in Duplin County. Lee Duval, who operates the Duval Prepackaging Company in Raleigh that puts out a prepackaged salad that is ready to be served says. There is still time to plant radishes."

The Coastal Plain Vegetable Research Station at Faison, N. C. has several varieties of salad vegetables growing now, and all farmers of his area are invited to stop by the station and let Mr. Frank Boyette, manager of the Research Station explain the advantages, disadvantages, and growth characteristics of each variety.

Boyette has three varieties of collards, turnips, mustard, kale, chise cabbage, rape, and radishes growing for anyone to see. A trip to see these growing could be well worth anyone's time even if they do not plan to grow commercially now but may sometime in the future.

Duval is very interested in getting someone to raise radishes for him. He is using 50 bags a week at the present time wet beach bag weighing 40 lbs. Mr. Duval likes the Giant Southern Cur variety of mustard for fresh packaging. He prefers the Vates collard and the Pomeranian white globe turnip.

Anyone interested in growing any of these vegetables should contact the Duplin County Agents of the Research Station for information.

## Cars Collide At Scott Store

## James Kenan Hangs 13-7 Defeat On Arch-Rival Wallace-Rose Hill Before Capacity Crowd At Tiger Field.

James Kenan's undefeated Tigers refused to yield the victory column to Wallace-Rose Hill last Friday night before over 2,000 fans and turned the tables 13-7 in one of the most jubilant victories in Tiger history.

The classy Tigers, ranked No. 1 in Class "A" competition by the Greensboro Daily News for the third straight week, extended their winning streak to five games without a loss this season by downing the Bulldogs to the sweetest tune ever, 13-7. ## Postal Receipts Increased \$3900 In 7 Years Here

A new all-time high in the nation's mail volume was reached during fiscal year 1960 ending June 30, which continued the steady upward trend of the past seven years at a rate which even exceeds the population growth, according to advance information from the Annual Report of the Post Office Department which has been made available to Postmaster A. C. Holland.

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 63.6 billion pieces of mail which includes about one billion pieces of parcel post. It was stated that this would mean an increase of nearly 25 per cent over the corresponding figures for 1953; when the annual volume was 50.9 billion pieces.

During this same period, it was pointed out, the revenue of the Department also has shown an impressive gain with an increase from \$2,091,714,000 fiscal year 1953 to (Continued On Back)

## A. F. Recruiter Says "Doors Again Open"

Sgt. Shelby W. Hill, U. S. Air Force Recruiter for the Kenansville area, announces that the Air Force Recruiting Service has opened its doors again to many applicants who before this time were unable to return to the Air Force or enlist in the Air Force after having completed service with other military branches. The new list of job skills needed by the Air Force for trained men now affects men separated from other branches of the armed forces; men previously turned down due to their military job training and skills should again contact their Air Force Recruiter. Many prior-service men will be given their same pay grade as held when discharged from service.

Sgt. Hill also states that he is now taking applications from lawyers for appointments as Judge Advocates in the Air Force; persons with prerequisite qualifications will be given direct commissions. A commission and appointment as a Judge Advocate offers legal experience not available in civilian courts, plus a great personal satisfaction of serving on the U. S. Defense team.

Sgt. Hill is located in the Post Office in Kenansville, N. C. and his office hours are from 1 p. m. to 3 p. m. each Wednesday. Letters inquires addressed to "USAF Recruiting Office, Room 207, Borden Building, Goldsboro, N. C." will be answered promptly. Sgt. Hill states.
