#### **Postal Receipts** Increased \$3900 In 7 Years Here

A new all-time high in the nation's mail volume was reached during fiscal year 1960 ending June 30,, which continued the steady upward trend of the past seven years at a rate which even exceeds the population growth, according to advance information from the Annual Report of the Post Office Department which has been made available to Postmaster A. C. Holland.

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 63.6 billion pieces of mail which includes about one oillion pieces of parcel post.
