Both types of Federal assitance will be available beginning October 1, 1960, to the States, which will administer and

share the costs of the programs. Under the stepped-up plan for aiding the needy aged, it is estimated that about \$142 million of Federal funds will be put into the program during the first full year of operation. Currently, about 2.4 million needy aged men and women stand to benefit.

For the aged who do not qualify for old - aged assitance but who are unable to pay medical bills, the new law will operate as follows: The States will determine the per-

sons who can qualify for benefits under the program. Each State will be responsible for developing its qualifying test.

The States will decide what hospital, medical, and surgical benefits are to be made available to make

To help finance this program, 'he Federal Government will make available, as of October 1 of this year, whatever funds are necessary in order to pay from 50 to 80 per cent of the cost of these benefits, the exact percentage to be determined on the basis of the per captia income of each State.

The large share of cost to be borne by the Federal Government under this new program gives the States an unusual opportunity -the opportunity to provide prompt and significant help to the Nationl's older citizens who need assistance to meet their medical expenses.


