Road Improvement For Duplin

The State Highway Commission has approved and set up funds for improvements to more than a dozen Duplin County roads.

Grading, draining and base work is scheduled on these roads: 2.1 miles of road 1702-Cabin Road, from road 1700 to NC 24; 1.7 mile of road 1330-Juniper Road, from road 1329 to the Sampson County line; 3 miles of road 1364-Pridgen Road, from road 1362 to road 1364; and 2.2 miles of road 1154 - Salmon Road, from road 1155 to NC 41.

Stabilization work will be done on these roads: 2.6 miles of road 2142-Branch Road from road 1155 to the beginning of pavement; 2.3 miles of road 1306-Rob Road, from road 1003 to the county line; 1.7 mile of road 1931-Hank Road, from road 1148 to road 1102; 2.5 miles of road 1918-Oxford Road, from NC 11 to road 1915; 1.7 mile of road 1389 - Ribbon Road, from road 1388 to road 1162; 1.4 mile of road 1369 - Velvet Road, from road 1368; and 1 mile of road 1981 - Debeson Road, from road 1980 to a dead end.

Grading and stabilization work is scheduled on the following roads which have been added to the State system: 0.75 mile of Loop Road, from US 117 to US 117; 0.59 mile of Smith and Simmons Road, from road 1545 to road 1546; and 0.59 mile of Curtis Hall Road, from road 1557 to a dead end.

Approximate cost of the work is \$103,000.

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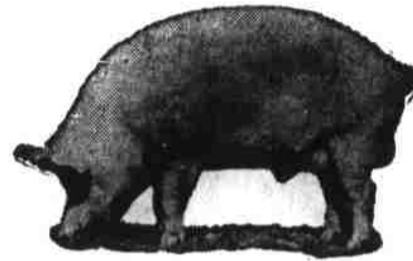
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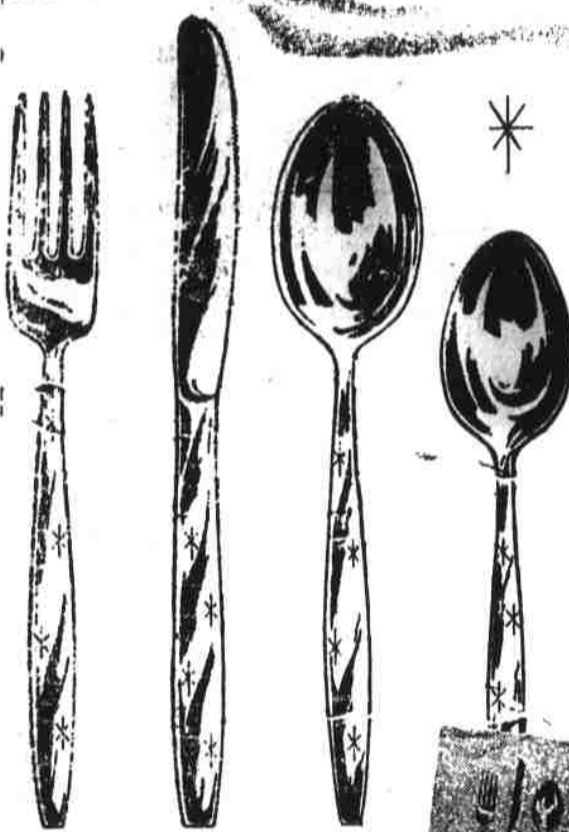


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
