Hattie Gavin Is Convicted On Two Abortion Counts

Hattie Gavin, 74-year old Warsaw Negro, was convicted in Duplin Superior Court last week and sentenced to one year in N. C. State Prison, Woman's Division, on two abortion charges.

Judge Malcolm Paul gave the sentence to the old Negro woman, who has been convicted in the past on similar charges.

She was committed to State Prison on Friday.

Lillie Milton, a Negro girl, testified that Hattie Gavin performed the abortions on her.

Also appearing as witnesses in the case were Frank McKiver, Duplin Sheriff Ralph Miller, who headed the investigation; Dr. G. S. Rasmussen and Dr. O. L. Redwine, and Nurse Mrs. Frances Quinn, all of Duplin General Hospital, where the Milton girl was treated.

3 MEN, BIG STILL TAKEN IN DUPLIN

A 1600 gallon still, described by County Sheriff Ralph Miller, as one of the largest captured in Duplin County, was raided Sunday morning by constables and a sheriff's deputy.

The still, in operation at the time of the raid, was steam rigged. Officers arrested three men at the scene. They were: James Albert Boyette, 32, Negro, of Albertson; Macon Samuel Clinton, 28, Negro, of LaGrange; and Willie Ray Sellers, 25, Negro, of Mt. Olive. Fifty-five large barrels of mash were found, along with 85 cases containing 189 gallons of non-tax paid whiskey.

The still was located on one side of Nahunga Swamp.

The three men were given a preliminary hearing and placed under \$500 bond each. They are to be tried in Superior Court November 16. Arresting officers were constables T. E. Revell and E. E. Proctor, Constable A. J. Summerlin and sheriff's deputy W. O. Houston accompanied the constables on the raid.

Warsaw Volunteer Firemen To Offer Rural Fire Protection With Your Help

"We have had a number of people in the neighboring rural areas surrounding Warsaw to ask us for aid in Fire Protection, and at this time we do not have the equipment necessary to do the job," said Chief Carroll Best of the Warsaw Dept.

The Dept., in regular meeting, two months ago decided to make an all-out effort to form a Rural Dept. and equip it properly. A committee was chosen to seek out the details and arrive at an estimate of the cost involved in setting up this new dept. The committee, working on the basis of information received from the North Carolina Fire Insurance Rating Bureau, reported that in order to have a dept. approved by the Rating Bureau a minimum of \$5,000.00 would be required to purchase and build the needed trucks and equipment.

Fireman W. C. Martin, Sec and Treasurer, said that a start has already been made on this project, in the purchase of a two ton truck, on which will be mounted a one thousand gallon tank for hauling water to the scene of the fire. Martin further stated that

this money came from voluntary contributions of rural property owners.

It should be noted by all rural property owners that when this project is completed it will cause a reduction in the insurance rate on all property in a radius of four miles of the town of Warsaw.

The Warsaw Firemen will conduct a canvass of all rural property owners in the four mile area on Sunday afternoon, the 23rd of October. At this time the firemen will solicit donations and contributions in the form of cash money or pledges toward the \$5,000.00 needed to provide this vital and necessary services.

Chief Best pointed out that the Warsaw Fire Dept. is a not-for-profit corporation whose sole purpose and aim is the safe guarding of life and property through fire protection, prevention, and fire fighting.

All rural residents and property owners are urged to contribute generously to this project which will cause them a reduced insurance rate, and may well be the means of saving their homes or even their lives.
