

Senator John F. Kennedy has been elected President of the United States for the next four years and Terry Sanford has been elected Governor of North Carolina for the next four years.

It was a Democratic sweep in North Carolina, except for the 10th Congressional District where incumbent Charles Jonas, a Republican, won. A record 10,223 persons voted in Duplin County, exceeding by 1,182 the previous high.

In Duplin County, it was a complete victory for the Democrats For President, Duplin gave Kennedy 7269 votes and Nixon 2954. For Governor, Sanford received 7318 votes while Robert Gavin received, 2812 vôtes.




