### Duplin County Has Record Vote In Demo Victory

Senator John F. Kennedy has been elected President of the United States for the next four years and Terry Sanford has been elected Governor of North Carolina for the next four years.

It was a Democratic sweep in North Carolina, except for the 10th Congressional District where incumbent Charles Jonas, a Republican, won. A record 10,223 persons voted in Duplin County, exceeding by 1,182 the previous high.

In Duplin County, it was a complete victory for the Democrats. For President, Duplin gave Kennedy 7269 votes and Nixon 2564.

For Governor, Sanford received 7318 votes while Robert Gavin received, 2812 votes.

For the other state offices the vote for Democrats of the council of 202,587 persons was 107,000 votes. For the U. S. Senate, incumbent Senator James H. Hunt received 7007 votes while Dye Haynes had 1764.

David Henderson, Congressman elect for the third district ran away in Duplin with 8084 votes while Jack Brinson received 1665.

County officials had no opponents. Votes were Russell Brock for Board of Education, 8190 votes; Lott Korngay and J. B. Stroud, County Commissioners, 8308 and 8251 votes respectively; Christine Williams, Register of Deeds, 9488 votes; Russell Lanier, Judge General, 8247; Hugh Johnson, House of Representatives, 8382.

Because the National Election was not certain of the outcome until 7:14 a. m. Wednesday morning, many citizens of the area stayed up most of Tuesday night. Most of the residents watching TV and listening to radio for the results finally called it a day around 3 a. m. Wednesday.

It had been figured in North Carolina that the religious issue would cost Kennedy the state. However, his margin of victory in the Tar Heel state will be in the neighborhood of 50,000 considerably more than Eisenhower. In 1928, Former President Herbert Hoover carried North Carolina when he defeated Al Smith, a Catholic.

Kennedy is the first Catholic ever to win a presidential election in the United States. He is the youngest President ever selected at 43 years of age. He is the second youngest President in history.

Conversation across the State Wednesday centered around Governor Terry Sanford's choice of Kennedy for the Democratic nomination when he did and at the time he did in Los Angeles. Most observers now believe it was one of the smartest moves made in the campaign so far as North Carolina was concerned.

### J-K Wins East Central Conference Championship Rohanan Sat. At Rockingham - First Playoff Game

WARSAW: The Undeatable James Kenan Tigers started slow but ended with a last pace last Friday night to down tough Beaulville 20-9 in an important East Central finish. It was the fifth straight conference win for the Tigers and ran their string to 18, ending the regular season undefeated. Beaulville had only lost one conference game up until the Tiger clash. James Kenan will travel to Rockingham this coming Saturday night to play strong Rohanan, winner of the Cape Fear Conference. Rohanan has very fine football team and has lost only one game this season and will go into the playoffs with an overall 9-1 record. They are real tough on defense and their offense attack is built around halfback Bob Idol. James Kenan began to roll late in the first quarter as they marched 30-yards to score. The score came with one minute and 54 seconds into the second quarter. The drive was featured by the running of All Conference fullback Danny Batts and All Conference halfback Hubert Merritt. Batts scored to give the Tiger a 6-0 lead at the half. The Beaulville defense lead by All Conference tackle Sloan Thigpen stalled most of the Tiger thru QB in the first half. Throughout most of the third quarter the Panthers and Tigers held each other with outstanding defensive play. Late in the third stanza the Tiger depth and power began to wear the big red and white down. James Kenan drove 73-yards late in the third period and early moments of the fourth quarter to score, clinaxed by Batts going over from five yards out. Second team All Conference Quarterback Jimmy Dixon ran the point to put James Kenan well in command 13-9. By the way Dixon was the only sophomore to make all conference. James Kenan scored again in the fourth quarter in a beautiful 6-yard

### Calypso Child Burned To Death

An eight month old negro child, Thomas Whitfield, was burned to death early Saturday night. The fire was caused from an exploding oil heater. The child was the grandson of Estier Whitfield, who was living in a tenant house on the farm of Ed Herring, near Calypso.

Eleven persons were in the five room house at the time the heater exploded in a bedroom. The grand mother and seven of her children made their escape, but were unable to save the baby boy. Firemen and rescue workers found his body after the flames had ceased. The body was badly burned.

Mt. Olive firemen assisted the Calypso fire department. According to Herring none of the survivors were injured, but Christine Whitfield, mother of the boy was taken to Mt. Olive for medical treatment. The family lost all of their household belongings and clothing.

### Charles Cottle Seriously Hurt Saturday Hit By Car When Standing Beside Road

Charles Cottle of Rose Hill remains in serious condition in Duplin General Hospital from injuries suffered on Saturday afternoon when he was struck by a car on a rural unpaved road, south of Rose Hill.

Cottle was standing at the side of a road beside a tractor when a car driven by Robert Earl Basden, 34 year old Rose Hill negro, rounded a curve while traveling South. The brakes which he applied to keep from hitting Cottle, failed, and according to investigating officer A. S. Butler, the automobile skidded out into the field after striking Cottle's body and hurling him about 60 feet and into the body of a pickup truck which was parked nearby. The truck belonged to Cottle.

Basden and two other persons who were at the scene rushed Cottle to a local doctor's office and he was transferred to Duplin General Hospital. Cottle suffered several broken ribs, broken collar bone, internal injuries, a punctured lung and a punctured spleen which had to be removed according to officers. Basden, driver of the 1963 Dodge denied being driver of the car, but was charged with careless and reckless driving, no brakes, no liability insurance and failure to transfer title. Pa. officers in the area testified that Basden was the driver. Basden is in Duplin County jail without prior record of bond pending Cottle's recovery, according to officers.

Pfc. J. C. Price of Warsaw and Chief Police Bill Gann of Rose Hill assisted Butler with the investigation.

### Fishing Access Area In Duplin

A Fishing Access Area is being built in Duplin County. The construction is under the supervision of the Engineering Division of the Wildlife Resources Commission. William Kinsey of Raleigh is in charge of the project, and it will be open to the public possibly within two weeks.

The access Area is for recreational purposes, and is a place for loading and unloading boats for fishing and for pleasure riding. The access area is the property of the State, as the state buys the land and develops it for this purpose for public use. This is the first and only such area in Duplin. The Fishing Access Area is located on highway 24, near "Old Man River," six miles East of Kenansville. Dunn Construction Company was low bidder and is in the process of building it now.
