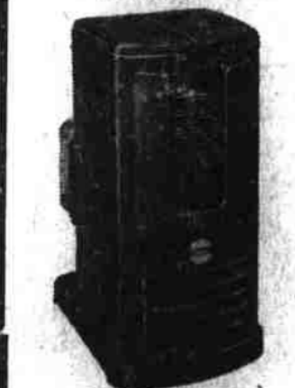
## Albertson HDC Met Tuesday
