The Poulity Diagnostic Laboratory at Rose Hill is now in full operation and is serving the growing coultry industry of Duplin and surrounding counties

eed for such a laboratory me acute when poultry farming argest source of income to farmers, second only to tobacco. Du County now leads North Carolina in poultry farming, which includes broiler, egg and turkey produc-

Dr. Hugh Powell, veteriarian in charge of the work at the Rose Hill laboratory, said today approximately 5,000 turkeys in breeding flocks are being tested each week. Also, an average of six farm flocks of broilers are tested daily and an approximately flocks check. ed weekly through the facilities at Rose Hill.

"We are checking more and more flocks," Dr. Powell said, "but we are still not doing as much work in diagnosing as we would like to do. Prevention is one of the greatest ways of fighting diseases in turkeys, hens and broilers. As soon as any slight sign of disease are not charged for tests run.


