In announcing Kalmar's selec-tion, Rufus Elks, County ASC office

manager, said "He is an outstand ing farmer and is doing a cood job with the resources at his disposal. Of the 600 acres in his farm, Kalmar has under production approxinately 200 acres. Of this acreage 15 acres are allotted to tobacco, 10 acres to cotton, approximately 90 acres to corn and about 60 acres in the Conservation Reserve program

As for his tobacco practices, Kal-mar said he believes in rotation and follows the "rotation practice every year possible. I try to have grain cover crop on it the year before planting tobacco on the land and turn it under. I don't believe in planting tobacco behind
