At a recent meeting in the County Agricultural Building, the nucleus of a Duplin County 4-H Club Development Foundation was perfected by several interested business men and women. The steering committee for the organization is made up of M. G. Cording, Chairman, of Wallace, and members: I. J. Sandlin, Jr., Beulaville; B. C. Albritton, Calypso; A. P. Cates, Faison; E. C. Thompson, Warsaw; Mrs. Violette K. Phillips, Kenansville; Mrs. Christine W. Williams, B. F. Grady; and Douglas Peacock, Wallace. The group was instructed on the history and purposes of the 4-H Development Fund by Bill Garmen from the State 4-H Development Foundation.

The Duplin County unit will be a part of the State 4-H Development Foundation which will serve as a channel through which financial and moral support can be mobilized for greater service to our rural youth. Each of the 100 counties are being organized.

The 4-H Development Fund is a program of support for 4-H Club programs in those areas which are not supported by tax funds; such as CAMPS, RECOGNITION, SCHOLARSHIPS, and world understanding through the INTERNATIONAL FARM YOUTH EXCHANGE CAMPS.

Present 4-H camping facilities can take care of only one out of every 20 4-H Club members in North Carolina. We have no 4-H camp located within a reasonable distance from Duplin County. Out of 1500 boys and girls currently enrolled in 4-H Clubs in our county, we had 20 who traveled to the 4-H camp, now located at Manteo, last year to enjoy a wonderful week of work and play together. One of the main objectives of the 4-H Development fund will be expanding 4-H camping facilities.

He is a graduate of N. C. State College and has served as a member of the County Board of Commissioners.

Duplin General Receives Appropriation From Duke Endowment Fund

\$1,835 has been appropriated to Duplin General Hospital, it was announced today.

The Trustees of The Duke Endowment have voted appropriations of \$1,111,302.94 for 137 hospitals and forty-three child care institutions in North and South Carolina, on the basis of their charitable work during the fiscal year ended September 30, 1960, Thomas L. Perkins, Endowment Chairman, announced today, February 9, 1961.

The latest appropriations - marking the thirty-sixth consecutive year that the Endowment has provided such hospital and child care aid - bring to a total of \$31,689,374.35 the funds furnished by the Endowment for these purposes alone since its creation in 1924.

The latest appropriations are for 96 hospitals and 29 child care institutions in North Carolina, and 41 hospitals and 14 child care institutions in South Carolina.

Hospitals are aided at the rate of one dollar for each free bed day of care rendered and child caring institutions received assistance at the rate of approximately forty-seven cents per day for each day of care rendered orphan and half-orphan children during the fiscal year ended September 30, 1960.

The 137 hospitals received \$718,207.00 and the 43 child caring institutions \$383,095.94. Additional hospitals whose applications had not been completed will be considered for appropriations at the February meeting of the Trustees, it was stated.

Cotton Acreage Deadline Near

Cotton farmers don't have much longer to decide whether they will plant their cotton acreage or release it. Rufus Elks Jr. office mgr. for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Duplin Co. Committee, expressed the hope that all cotton farmers will get a clear picture of the choice they have to make before the deadline for releasing cotton acreage. Hassell says that the deadline varies by counties but that he hopes all cotton that will not be planted will be released to the ASC County Committee during high light week, February 20-24, or before that time if the farmer has already decided what he intends to do.

Elks says that complete release of cotton acreage which will not be planted this year could go a long way toward solving the problems of cotton farmers, ginners, and processors. If Tar Heel cotton farmers do not plant their full acreage or take advantage of the acreage release provision they will bring about a considerable cut in this state's cotton acreage. With cotton bringing nearly 40 million dollars annually to farmers in this state we just can't afford to reduce our state's farm income in this manner.

According to Elks though, all the advantage from releasing and replanting cotton acreage does not go only to the farmer who will be able to plant the released acreage this year. The farmer who released the acreage benefits just as much as the farmer who received the released acreage. Releasing acreage benefits just as much as the farmer who received the released acreage. Releasing acreage he can't plant is the only way a farmer can retain planting history and keep from cutting his own future allotments.

Farmers who cannot plant their full cotton acreage this year should by all means go by their ASC County Office and release the acreage they will not use.

Rose Hill Negro Is Found Dead Sunday In Shack

Herman Marshall, 30-year-old Rose Hill Negro, was found dead in a shack inside the Rose Hill City Limits Sunday night by Police Chief Bill Quinn and Genstatle Bill Sholar.

Officer Quinn said the whereabouts of Marshall after his family reported Sunday that he had not returned home Saturday night and wanted to know if he had been jailed.

"Marshall was a heavy drinker," Officer Quinn said, "and he had been locked up on several occasions and charged with public drunkenness."

Investigation revealed that Marshall had been placed in the shack by Hoover Banerman, a Negro after Marshall became ill. Coroner Hector McNeil has not made a ruling on the cause of death to date, according to Officer Quinn.

4-H Trains, Develops For The Future Duplin Has 1,500 4-H Club Members

4-H Club work an educational program for boys and girls is under the direction of Cooperative Extension Service of U. S. Department of Agriculture and the State Land Grant Colleges.

In Duplin at the present time there are 1500 members in 32 organized 4-H clubs. Twenty-two of these clubs meet monthly at schools and the others are conducted by volunteer community leaders.

Two Duplin Men Charged With Several Thefts

Buddy Ray Carter and William Bryant Lee, two Duplin County men, have been picked up by the Duplin Sheriff's Department and turned over to Mount Olive authorities to face charges of breaking and entering and larceny.

Sheriff Ralph Miller said today that Carter, 28, and Lee, 16, were tried this week before County Judge Russell Lanier on charges of stealing \$20 worth of shelled corn from Durwood King in the Ramon Chapel section. No judgement was handed down by Lanier and is pending on the outcome of the trial in Mt. Olive.

They are charged in Mount Olive with entering several businesses and stealing various quantities of goods and merchandise.

Five Youths Charged With Rape Out Of Jail On \$2,500 Bond Each

The five Duplin County white youths, who had been jailed and charged with the rape of a 14-year-old white girl on Christmas night are out of jail on \$2,500 bond each. Superior Court Judge Chester Morris after a preliminary hearing, ordered bond to be available for the five youths.

The five youths, ranging in age from 14 to 19 years, were indicted by the Duplin County Grand Jury on January 24 after it was called to its attention that the rape had allegedly occurred on December 25

in a lonely wooded area in the Scott's Store section.

The hearing into the case revealed that the father of the girl who was allegedly raped had sworn out warrants charging the youths with rape on December 26, and were later picked up.

The initial warrants had been sworn out before Justice of Peace Jack Sitterson, in Kenansville. Sitterson said the girl's father returned

to Kenansville on the same day he swore out the warrants and asked that the charges be dropped. The warrants were picked up and the initial charges dropped because no hearing had been held.

After the five youths were jailed on order of the Grand Jury, Dr. Guy Gooding, who was the examining physician on December 26, the day after the alleged rape, said the girl "had had sexual intercourse."
