Spence Commissioned Ensign

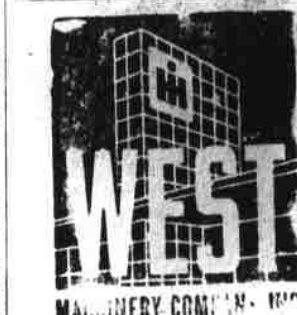
