Four New Rose Varieties

Four new rose varieties are announced this month as winners of the All-America Rose Selections Award for 1962. This is the first time in 12 years that as many as four selections have been named for this high honor.

Sharing the spotlight are John S. Armstrong, Christian Dior, Golden Slippers and King's Ransom.

John S. Armstrong is a Grandiflora. In color it is a distinctive, intense, velvety red. When fully open the flowers range up to four inches across. The deep red color is "absolutely color fast" and will not burn or take on a bluish hue. Flowers are borne in clusters with stems long enough for cut flowers and arrangements. The plant is shapely and grows to a height of 4 or 5 feet.

King's Ransom is a Hybrid Tea. The rich chrome yellow flowers, up to 4 or 5 inches, are borne in great abundance on long strong stems. Open blooms are resistant to wind damage and well under adverse weather conditions. The

constant covering habit. Golden Slippers is a Floribunda type and is unique in color character. Fine orange bright gold buds, perfectly formed, marked and flushed with red. As the bud opens the upper petal surface is a luscious orange-vermillion which with a glow of gold underneath. The center of the flower is a vibrant yellow. This variety is ideal for landscaping, low borders or mass planting effects.

Christian Dior is the first red Hybrid Tea chosen for an All-America Award since 1953. The flowers are crimson red overlaid with scarlet. It is probably the first red rose with a yellow base. This character increases its brightness. The plant is upright with
