## Hearing On Bill To Establish Periodic Review Of U. S. Grants-In-Aid Set

Rep. L. H. Fountain (D.-N.C.), Chairman of the Intergovernmental Relations Subcommittee, House Committee on Government Operations, today announced that the Subcommittee will hold hearings on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, July 25-26, to receive testimony on H.R. 7802 and seven identical bills "To provide for periodic Congressional review of Federal grants-in-aid to State and local units of government."

Sponsors of the legislation are Mr. Fountain, Mrs. Dwyer (R.-N.J.), Mr. Ikard (D.-Iowa), Mr. Smith (D.-Iowa), Mr. Langen (R.-Minn.), Mr. Curtis (R.-Mo.), Mr. Pelly (R.-Wash.), and Mr. Seeley Brown (R.-Conn.).

Rep. Fountain stated that Subcommittee hearings in the past had disclosed public concern over the difficulty of reorienting or terminating a long-standing Federal grant program after it had substantially served its initial purpose.

These bills would establish a uniform policy and procedure whereby future programs of grant assistance to the States or their political subdivisions will be systematically reviewed at stated intervals to insure that such programs are redirected to meet new conditions or terminated if their original purposes have been achieved. The proposed legislation would not apply to programs already in existence.

The Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, established by Congress in 1959, recently recommended such legislation in its report entitled "Periodic Congressional Reassessment of Federal Grants-in-Aid to State and Local Governments." Mr. Fountain, Mrs. Dwyer and Mr. Ikard serve as Congressional members on the Advisory Commission. Other members of the Commission include Senators, Cabinet Members, Governors, State legislators, mayors, county officials and private citizens.

Chairman Fountain stated that the Subcommittee is interested in receiving the views of individuals and organizations on the need for and feasibility of the proposed legislation. He also expressed the hope that witnesses would limit their attention to the merits of H.R. 7802 and not concern themselves with particular grant programs.

## "Choose-It-Yourself" Vocational Training Now Being Offered By Army

Governor Sanford's recent reference to the alarming school 'drop-out' figures for 1959-60, in which 43,404 students stopped short of graduation, while 45,271 graduated

The applicant is able to choose, qualify, and know "in advance"

without the slightest obligation to enlist, according to Sergeant La Fevre.

then adjourned and Mrs. Lorraine lect. Refreshments of chocolate pie, coffee, and potato chips were served to the six members present.

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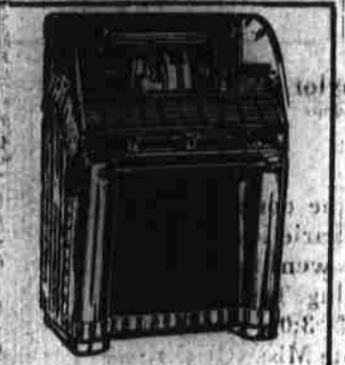
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
