"Festival of the Arts" Theme Of Rally To Be Held Sunday In Clayton

A "Festival of the Arts" will be the theme of a rally sponsored by the Universalist Convention of North Carolina at the Clayton Memorial Universalist Church in the Woodington community south of Kinston on Sunday, July 30.

An art show will be featured in the Woodington Community Building. Both amateur and professional artists are being invited to show their work.

The day's program will begin with a worship service at 11:00 a. m. at the Clayton Memorial church, located one mile east of Highway 258 about eight miles south of Kinston. Rev. Kenneth K. Marshall minister of the Woodington, Kinston, and Outlaw's Bridge churches, will preach on "The Artists as Prophet." Mr. Marshall has studied "religion and art" at Yale University and the University of Chicago.

Community Building will feature a modern interpretative dance by Mrs. Patty Blosser of Raleigh and an illustrated lecture on "The Meaning and Symbolism of Church Architecture" by Mr. Dale Blosser of Raleigh. Mr. Blosser is an architect, having studied at Clemson, Carnegie Tech and North Carolina State College. He is past president of the Carolinas Unitarian Universalist Conference and current vice president of the Thomas Jefferson Unitarian Universalist Council (Composed of over 80 churches in nine southeastern states).

Honored On Birthdays

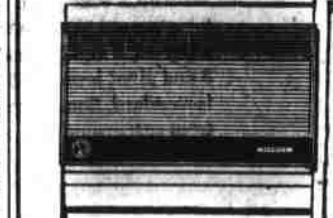
