A. S. C. NOTES

Tobacco Marketing Cards Mailed
Tobacco Marketing Cards for the 1961 crop of flue cured tobacco were mailed to producers in Duplin County last Friday. It is the producer's responsibility to:

1. Keep the card in his possession at all times.
2. See that only tobacco produced on the farm for which the card is prepared for is marketed on the card.
3. If the card is lost, stolen or destroyed, report it to the county office.

Soybeans Support Rate
The support rate for soybeans produced in North Carolina in 1961 has been set at \$2.26 per bushel. This support rate was set 46c above the level that prevailed in 1960, and is based on the national average support price announced earlier at \$2.30 per bushel for 1961 crop soybeans grading No. 2 or better.

To be eligible for support under the 1961 operation, soybeans must be produced in 1961. Producers

must also maintain their 1959-60 average acreage of conserving and idle land on the farm in 1961.

Wool Incentive Payments
The Duplin County ASC office has made payment to two producers of shorn wool for the 1960 marketing year. These payments amount to \$268.89 for 1959 pounds of shorn wool.

The 1961 marketing year began April 1, 1961 and ends March 31, 1962.

If there is any producer of shorn or unshorn wool who has not filed application for their incentive payment they should come by the county ASCS office and do so. Also, please bring the bill of sale with you.

Surplus Labor Offsets Japan Land Shortage

A small paper bag encases each apple as it grows to protect it from insect damage in Japanese orchards.

Such labor-consuming practices are common in Japanese agriculture, where the disadvantage of a limited amount of land has been partially offset by the substitution of labor for land. With but 12.7 million acres of land, Japan's farmers produce 80 per cent of the food requirements of the 93.6 million people who live in an area smaller than California.

Intensive research-6,500 research workers; and education programs-12,000 extension workers have helped boost yields of farm crops by six percent per year since 1950.

But agricultural imports are required to meet the food deficit and obtain raw materials for manufacture.
