Although he will be unable to be in Charlotte in person for the Fair opening, President Kennedy will make the formal announcement which opens the mammoth trade event when he steps from his plane the Raleigh-Durham Airport at 10 A. M. on October 12.

At 2:30 p. m. on October 12, at Charlotte, the North Carolina Fair will be formally opened by Governor Terry Sanford. Secretary of Commerce Luther H.
