Turkey Marketing Order Hearings Set For November 20-22 In Richmond, Va.

Producers in Duplin County will be interested in public hearings on the proposed nationwide marketing orders for turkeys and hatching eggs. The hearings for the North Carolina area will be held November 20-22 in the Southern States Cooperative Building in Richmond, Va. All turkey producers and hatching egg producers are invited to attend. The marketing order would be the first ever to be applied to a national commodity. It has been proposed by the National Turkey Producers Association. The proposed marketing order would be submitted by the National Turkey Marketing Committee, headed by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman at the request of industry representatives.

Overproduction and falling prices for the industry have caused a critical economic situation for many producers. Included in the proposed marketing order are provisions for market research and development, regulation of grade, size and quality at the handler level, prohibitions on unfair trade practices, and supply management. If the marketing order is issued, a 50-member advisory board would be appointed by Secretary Freeman. Nominations for membership would be made by the industry at state nominating meetings. A 10-member administrative committee would be appointed from the board. Membership of the board and committee would be representative of all segments of the industry.

Negro Man Killed Sunday In Wreck Near Beulaville

Smith Bryant, 47-year-old route 1, Beulaville Negro, was killed Sunday afternoon in a one-car accident. Bryant was riding in a car driven by John M. Williams, 47-year-old white man from Kenansville at the time of the fatal accident, according to investigating officer, Patrolman A. S. Butler, Jr. Investigation reveals that the car traveled 300 feet on the shoulder of the highway and another 130 feet off the road out of control. The car turned over several times and all occupants were thrown from the car. William Ward, 50-year-old Negro, of route 1, Beulaville was also a passenger in the car. He received a broken ankle. Williams received lacerations of the head and several broken ribs with possible chest injuries. Both Williams and Ward are in Duplin General Hospital. According to Patrolman Butler, Williams is charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and careless and reckless driving resulting in death.

Henderson To Speak At Citizens Dinner In Interest Of Campbell College, Thurs.

Congressman David Henderson will be principal speaker at a citizens dinner meeting to be held in the interest of Campbell College in Wallace Thursday evening. The event will launch a drive in Duplin County to support Campbell's preparation for full senior college standing. The school enrolls its first 100 college juniors this fall as the current term opened. It will install the fourth year next September. This will be Henderson's second appearance in behalf of Campbell's statewide effort to raise this year the \$725,000 needed for the science building now going up on the campus in Bule's Creek.

The Thursday night meeting is set for 7 p. m. in the American Legion Home at Wallace. Other speakers will be Harry Carter, vice-president of J. P. Stevens Company and Leslie H. Campbell, president of the college. Master of ceremonies will be Milford Quinn, Warsaw wholesale executive. Quinn is chairman of Campbell's development effort in the Duplin County area.

'Tom Thumb' Comes Home After 4th Prison Break

William E. "Tom Thumb" Hines, white, 22, escaped prisoner from Beaufort County Prison Farm, was apprehended in Sampson County around 4:15 p. m. Tuesday. Hines, well known in Kenansville and by Sheriff's Officers, came back to Duplin County after his escape Monday and again stole a car, this one belonging to Norman Dail, route 1, Chinquapin. The 1955 Ford was stolen from in front of the Duplin County Welfare Department Tuesday around 9:50 a. m. The stolen car was reported to the Sheriff's Department around 10:15 a. m. Hines was wearing a blue suit and arrived in Kenansville unnotified. Dail had parked his car and one into the Welfare Department when Hines picked it up. When Dail came out of the Welfare Department, his car was gone. It was reported immediately to the Duplin Sheriff's Department. The car had approximately a half tank of gasoline when stolen. Hines had previously stolen three cars in Kenansville. He stole his first car when he was 12 years old from Bell and Kelly Motors, in Kenansville. He also has stolen a

car from Collis Miller and one from Myrtle Earle Quinn, both of Kenansville. He also broke into Service Motor company once and stole the company's safe. Hines has made it a practice to escape from Prison Farms and Camps in North Carolina. This is his fourth escape for the young prisoner who is serving a long hitch or his escapades. Hines had been made an "honor grade" prison only Monday when he accomplished his escape. He will probably be tried in the January Term of Criminal Superior Court for the latest larceny and another sentence attached to his already long prison term and record.

Warsaw Dedicates New Air Port

McCullen Field, a public Air Port in Warsaw was officially dedicated on Saturday, November 11. Miss North Carolina cut the ribbons, putting the final stamp on the dedication. The Air Port has been completed for landing and taking off. In the future, a hanger, unicom (unicom-private pilot frequency for air port communication), gas and oil tanks will be added. This 150 foot wide and 4250 foot long air port has been in the process of being built for the past year and one-half, but due to weather conditions the completion had been delayed. Roy Dunn of Kenansville has done the work under the supervision of Clay McCullen who built and financed the air port. Larry McCullen states that this is the longest turf airport in eastern North Carolina and will accommodate up to a DC-3. McCullen further states that it was built for air convenience and to help the town of Warsaw. He believes that it will aid in bringing industry to the town. Warsaw now has A. C. L. in town, Highways 24 and 117, and now with air facilities, McCullen believes that there is no reason for not seeing bigger and better growth in the town. The Air Port is located on Highway 24, back of Joe Sutton's grocery store. At the ceremonies on Saturday Clay and Larry McCullen made a few fitting words of explanation as to the origin and use of the

Air Port. Larry introduced Miss North Carolina who officially cut the ribbons thereby dedicating another step of progress in the town of Warsaw. J. Milton West Funeral Sunday.
