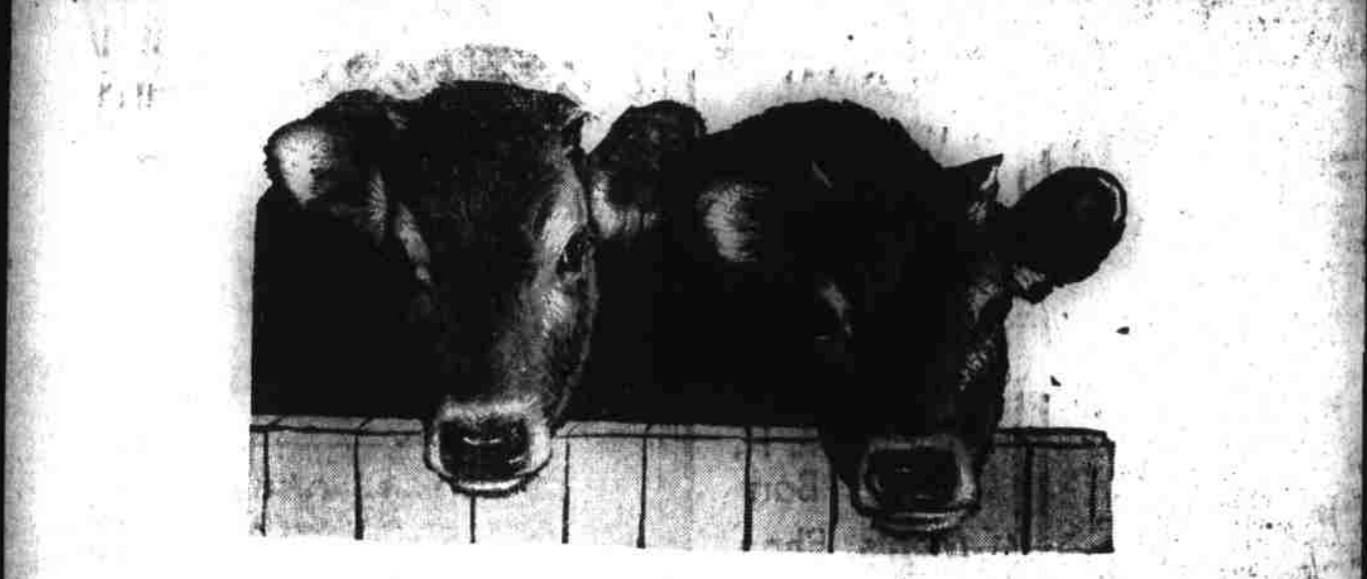
Oak Ridge Com. Club Had Busy Year; Dressed Dolls For Retarded Children
