If Only He Hadn't Been "Tailgating"



It takes a minimum of 90 feet to stop a vehicle traveling 60 miles per hour, according to traffic engineers at Liberty Mutual Insurance Company. Before even the best driver can react to an emergency ahead, a vehicle moving at this speed travels more than 23 feet.

Laws of physics such as this proved fatal to more than 14,000 persons involved in vehicular collisions last year. This same disdain for physical principles caused the death of 1,700 more as a result of collisions with other fixed objects. In all, motor vehicle accidents resulting from such causes as carelessness, recklessness, speed and drinking took 38,200 lives last year and cost the nation \$6 1/2 billion.

Drivers are cautioned by traffic engineers at Liberty to obey the rule-of-thumb set down by state traffic authorities: "For each 10 miles per hour registered on your speedometer, allow at least one car length between you and the vehicle ahead." This way, the laws of physics and the rules of the road work together to help prevent accidents.
