## Free Tickets For Homer Briarhopper Show At Farmer Appreciation Days In Wallace

Homer Briarhopper and his troupe of musicians will present a big show of country and western music as one of the highlights of Wallace's Farmer Appreciation Days, to be held Friday and Saturday, May 18 and 19.

The Homer Briarhopper show is on tap for Saturday night at 8:00 p. m. at Farmers No. 1 Warehouse in Wallace, located on Highway 117 north. The well-known singer of country and western tunes Clyde Moody will appear as a special guest star with the Homer Briarhopper Band, it was announced.

"This group is very popular in Raleigh and throughout the State," a spokesman for the Farmer Appreciation Days program pointed out. "We are very happy to have them come to Wallace for this big celebration and hope that farmers and their families from throughout the area will come to Wallace for this show and all other events."

Farmer Appreciation Days is being sponsored in Wallace by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and merchants of the Town of Wallace participating.

Free tickets to both the Homer Briarhopper Show on Saturday night and the Jim Thornton Show on Friday night (to be held at Farmers No. 1 Warehouse also) are available from all Wallace merchants. Farm families have only to request these tickets from their favorite merchants.

"Plans are shaping up well for the big two-day celebration, with merchants to feature special buys throughout the week of May 13," a Jaycee spokesman said. "The big events gets underway on Friday, May 19, with a parade at 4:00 p. m., and the Jim Thornton Show at 8:00 p. m. On Saturday, a Swine Show will be held at 10:00 a. m. at Farmers No. 1 Warehouse, followed by a barbecue lunch at the warehouse at 12:00 noon. Plates of de-

licious pork barbecue will be available at minimum prices. At 2:00 p. m. Saturday, the Home Demonstration Club Fashion Show is on tap, to be followed by a big Gospel Sing, with both local and out-of-town singing groups to be featured. The Homer Briarhopper Show with Clyde Moody will wind up the big two-day Farmers Day event with a bang Saturday night."

## Baysden Indicted, Bond Set At \$75,000 4 Others Named In Counterfeit Charge

Bond was set at \$75,000 for William Earl Baysden of Jacksonville who was indicted by a federal grand jury Tuesday on charges connected with a secret service crackdown on a counterfeit ring. Baysden was tried on counterfeit charges in 1958.

Four others named in the indictment were Clennie Humphrey and Norwood Whaley, both of Richlands, Edward D. Sparrow of Kinross and Edward E. Thorpe of Richmond, Va. Bond for each of them was \$25,000.

District Attorney Robert Cowen said Secret Service men seized more than \$100,000 in bogus \$20 bills Sunday. The head of the Secret Service office in Charlotte, Vernon D. Spicer, identified Humphrey and Whaley as employees of Baysden's furniture store and Sparrow as a printer.

Baysden was convicted in 1958 when \$776,000 in bogus \$20 bills were found by agents in a deep freeze in his store. However the conviction was reversed by the U. S. Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals because of improper search warrant.

The grand jury charged the bills had been printed for Baysden by Sparrow, Whaley and Thorpe. Dist. Attorney Robert Cowen said the next term of court at New Bern, where the men will be tried, is scheduled for May 21. He said he did not know if the case could be heard then.

The Rev. Mrs. Grady Wessell Crosby of Lynchburg, Virginia, will speak at a rally of Unitarians and Universalists from North and South Carolina and eastern Georgia, meeting at Raleigh, North Carolina on Sunday, April 29.

Mrs. Crosby, born in 1911 at Iowa City, Iowa, was graduated from Ohio Wesleyan University and received a Bachelor of Laws degree from Harvard Law School in 1954. She practiced law in Ohio from 1954 to 1957.

## "Science All Around Us" Theme Of Science And Health Exhibit At School

Wednesday, April 18th, from 2:30 till 3:00, a Science and Health exhibit was held by the Beaufort Elementary grades in Mrs. Vera Bostic's room. The theme was "Science All Around Us." It consisted of experiments facts, and works of nature contributed by different grades. Included among the exhibits was a fire extinguisher, an erupting volcano, atoms and molecules made from candy and tooth picks, a train engine, an electric motor, a telegraph complete with the transmitter and receiver, and home made door bells.

In the way of nature there was the life stages of a tadpole, from the egg to the frog, represented by different size tadpoles. Turtles were penciled in aquariums suited to their natural habitats. The fly and the bee were illustrated by a full scale drawing of their life cycle. There was a display of a few of the homes of some insects.

In the soil mineral department there were rock collections and demonstrations of the layers of soil. There were charts on coal and oil and their uses.
