William Earl Baysden, 44, a Jackonville businessman considered to be the boss of the bogus bill ring, was sent to prison for 15 years and fined a total of \$15,000. The operation he oversaw - and to which he entered a plea of guilty - had produced nearly \$1.5 million in fraud-ulent \$20 bills.
