Non-fied Tobacco Sales Extended Eastern Bell

The following telegram was received today from Congressman David N. Henderson.

Congressman David N. Henderson announced today that a decision has been reached by the Department of Agriculture to extend the same privilege of non-fied tobacco sales to the Eastern Bell that will be available to the Markets of the Border Belt a nd South Carolina.

It had been earlier decided that such sales would only be permitted on the markets in South Carolina and the Border Belt. Henderson and other representatives of the Eastern Bell had strongly objected to such procedure as discriminating against their regions, contending that if such sales were to be permitted they should be extended to all alike.

During the first five sale days of each market, price support will be available only on high, including primings and nondescript grades which otherwise are eligible for price support and are offered for sale in unified form. Beginning on the sixth day, price support will only be available for eligible grades of all tobacco in tied form. Support prices on the unified tobacco are expected to run approximately \$4.00 per hundred less than for the same grades in tied form.

Mr. Henderson expressed the feeling that such a decision was not fair to the farmers and markets of Eastern North Carolina if such sales are to be permitted in South Carolina and Border Belt areas.

COUNTERFEIT CHARGE
Baysden Gets 15 Years 3 Others Get Terms

A large counterfeit operation came to an end in New Bern Tuesday as prison sentences were handed to four participants in the operation by Federal Judge John Larkins. Two others were ordered to serve probationary terms.

William Earl Baysden, 44, a Jacksonville businessman considered to be the boss of the bogus bill ring, was sent to prison for 15 years and fined a total of \$15,000. The operation he oversaw - and to which he entered a plea of guilty - had produced nearly \$1.5 million in fraudulent \$20 bills.

Baysden's final admission of guilt came Tuesday morning when, at an early hour, he led federal agents to a wooded area in Jacksonville and showed them a rusty lard can containing about \$300,000 in the phony bills, part of \$600,000 believed to have been manufactured in the past two years. Some \$200,000 is still unaccounted for.

Other prison sentences went to: Edward D. Sparrow, 63, of Kinston, 7 1/2 years; Norwood Whaley, 34, of Richlands, five years; and Edward W. Thorpe, 57, of Richmond, Va., 7 1/2 years.

Cleotis Humphrey, 37, of Richlands, charged with concealing knowledge of certain phases of the bogus bill operation, was given a three-year probationary sentence.

Robert Fountain, 41, also of Richlands, received a five-year probationary term for criminal information listing two counts.

William Dewey Jacobs, charged with conspiracy in a 1958 money making scheme, was placed on probation for five years and did not receive a prison sentence.

The defendants showed no emotion as Judge Larkins sentenced them. Only Baysden admitted being upset.

Kenneth Grady, of the Sarecta section of Duplin county chairman of Duplin's County Commissioners, declared he was in favor of replacing Phillips' present tax collector.

Taxman Harry L. Phillips has been under fire since it was reported last week that a number of pieces of property in Duplin had been sold for much less than their real value in tax foreclosure sales. Several of the property items involved were sold to Phillips' brother, and one to his wife.

It was being claimed by Phillips' opponents that the public, nor officials of Duplin county were notified of the sales, and therefore public bidding for the property, as required by law, did not take place.

For this reason, it was claimed, the property was sold for "ridiculously low" prices.

Grady declared that he was personally in favor of replacing Mr.

Phillips Says Sale Of Land Within Tax Law

Duplin County Tax Collector Harry L. Phillips, of Kenansville, declared that every piece of property sold by his office in tax foreclosure proceedings has been sold strictly according to law.

Phillips was replying to a story in the paper originating with Chairman of the Duplin County Commissioners, Kenneth Grady, in which Grady expressed the opinion Phillips should resign his office.

Phillips' statement said "Every tax piece of property that has been sold in Duplin county has been sold according to law and has been authorized by the court for a deed transfer. Any of the public that is confused on this matter, if they will come and see me, I will be glad to show them that every sale was performed legally, in accordance with the law and the court."

"Moreover," he said in his statement, "I have personally told Mr. Phillips, and all other members of the Board of County Commissioners how I feel. I believe all property involved in these sales should be ordered re-sold, so that full market value could be received, and all money received above taxes due be paid to the owners."

The tax collector is appointed by the board of commissioners, but Grady intimated he had not yet been able to line up enough support for his point of view to force Phillips' resignation.

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Annual Homemakers Week June 18-22 Excellent Classes Have Been Planned

Several Changes have been made this year in the annual Farm Week at N. C. State College. First the name has been changed to "Homemakers Week". The activities have been re-arranged as follows:

June 18, State Executive Board Meeting (for executive Board Members Only.)

June 19, State Home Demonstration Council - for County Council Presidents, Executive Board Members, Past State Presidents and state committee Chairman and one Home Agent per County.

June 20, Annual Meeting of N. C. Organization of Home Demonstration Clubs. This is for every Club member.

June 21 - 22 Classes.
Excellent classes have been planned for everybody. These classes are not designed just for home demonstration members only. Civic clubs, garden clubs and community development groups are asked to send representatives.

Most of the classes will be in air conditioned Harrelson Hall. Rooms are available at the college dormitories for a reasonable rate. A registration fee for all who attend will be \$1.00 per person.

A brief summary of the classes follows.

Homemaker's Week 1962 - Classes and Other Activities
"Foods for Special Occasions" - Mrs. Mavis M. Gibbs, Home-making Editor, The Southern Planter, Richmond, Virginia. This will include suggestions for family or company meals to serve on birthdays, holidays, and other special events.

"Music for Worship" - Dr. Arnold E. Hoffman, State Director of Music, N. C. Department of Public Instruction, Raleigh, N. C.

Nita Orr, Extension Frozen Foods Specialist, N. C. State College, will teach a class on "Food Freezing Today and Tomorrow." Frozen food subjects will be treated the way they are done on television with question and answer periods between each "show". The classes will include (1) timely frozen food information, and (2) a peeking into the future frozen food world. In addition, Miss Orr will have staff members from Food Science and Horticulture Departments at N. C. State College assisting as well as George Hall, Director of WUNS-TV, State College's television station.

"Why Do We Act That Way" will be taught by Edward W. Pope, Specialist in Child Development and Family Relations, Federal Extension Service, USDA Washington, D. C.

"Be a Smart Santa Claus - and exhibit of what's new in creative play materials for young children with a discussion on how to get the most from the family's play equipment dollar - will be taught by L. Frances Jordan, Extension Specialist in Family Relations, N. C. State College, Raleigh, N. C.

There will be crafts classes taught by Mrs. Ross Messick Melvin of the Raleigh Public Schools, John H. Harris, Extension Horticulturist, N. C. State College.
