## Wreck Injures Youths Monday Night

Brad Minshew, age 16, of Warsaw and Stuart Parker of Chinquapin, were in an automobile wreck on Monday night, which injured both occupants of the car and completely demolished the car which was being driven by Brad Minshew. The accident occurred at the intersection of paved rural road, number 154, and N. C. highway No. 56. Brad was driving west and according to reports, he failed to stop at the stop sign, ran across N. C. Highway 56 and into an embankment. The steering wheel was knocked loose and back into the car. The 1958 Rambler which he was driving is a total loss.

## Deadline Nears For Some Turkey Voters

Raleigh - All turkey producers eligible to vote in the upcoming referendum on the National Turkey Marketing Order were urged today to file, at the proper ASCS office as soon as possible, their certification of turkey marketed in 1961. A. P. Hassell, Jr., Executive Director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation State Committee, points out that this is particularly important, since June 8 is the deadline for "contract-producers" and cooperative to file such certification. There are few questions raised about "producer-growers." Hassell declared, "but a good deal of misunderstanding about 'contract-producers' who are eligible to vote in the referendum if they have a 'proprietary interest' in the turkey product. Apparently, the trouble arises because people don't understand just what 'proprietary' means under the turkey marketing order. The 'contract-producer' who is eligible to vote is a person who participates in the production of turkeys with the risk of loss. If the person who finances the grower by way of contract for feed, housing, or other supplies, signs a contract with the grower, the grower must sign that the grower will assume the financial risk of loss. However, if the arrangements provide that the grower's liability is to be limited, the grower is not eligible to vote."

## Farrior Killed Whitehead Sunday

James Isaac (Zeb) Farrior, 45, at 21, colored, shot and killed Roosevelt Whitehead, about 45 with a 12 gauge sawed-off shotgun. The shooting occurred about midnight on Sunday night at the Edge Farrior Place. The cause of the shooting had not been determined, but the case is still under investigation, according to authorities. Farrior is in the Duplin County Jail without bail.

## Elementary Science Workshop For Teachers Begins at James Kenan on Tues

The emphasis which will be used in the workshop will be a laboratory approach to scientific concepts in the following areas: Magnetism and Electricity, Mechanics, Air and Air Pressure, Heat, Introduction to Elementary Chemistry, Biological Science, Light and Sound. Teachers participating in the workshop will have the opportunity to do demonstrations and experiments in all areas listed above. Byron Teacher Assistant Superintendent, states: "There is a great deal of interest among teachers in the proposed workshop and it is felt that the program will be most practical since the most important aspect of the workshop will be to provide for 'learning by doing.'"

Maready and Cavanaugh, who were also in the race, received 57 and 92 votes respectively.
