Our Trip To Cape Canaveral

Tuscarora Council The First Region Six Explorer Rendezvous Cape Canaveral, Florida

On Saturday morning June ninth a party of eight explorers and one adult leader from the Tuscarora Council left the Goldsboro Community Building for Patrick Air Force Base, the missile test center at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

The group traveled all day and stopped that night at the Stardust Motel in Woodbine, Georgia, some sixty miles from the Florida state line. On Sunday June tenth the group again set out for Patrick, planning to be checked in no later than four o'clock that afternoon. On the way down the group stopped at St. Augustine to visit the old Spanish Fort, Castillo De San Marco, a truly, fascinating place, however we had to pass by several other interesting landmarks being a little short of time.

We arrived at Patrick at approximately three-thirty, and were assigned to our quarters. Later the same afternoon we were taken out to the U. S. S. Observation Island, a ship in Canaveral Harbor, where we spent most of the day on a tour of various sections of the ship and learning a few facts about the equipment aboard which turned out to be quite educational.

In the days that came we had various schedules which to follow. We did such things as planting trees, cleaning off the grounds, having lectures and films on several missile shots, doing physical training, having survival training, flying over the Canaveral launching area itself, and seeing two missile shots. Our particular group could not go on the scheduled flight due to weather conditions but another flight was set up for the morning of departure, it was a real thrill to see an aerial view of the Cape.

Upon returning from our flight we boarded our estate wagon for our long journey home. On the way we stopped at Silver Springs a remarkably beautiful place where we spent much of the afternoon on a tour of the many exciting places there. We also went swimming in the crystal clear waters, which was a real treat. We arrived safely home the following evening.
