It you would like selp with filing, come by your Farm Bureau Office in Kenansville, which has a calender that is helpful for farmers to keep a record of the gas used, and in which equipment used, and date it was used. You may get one from the office.

farm tractor and farm equipment' are defined as a farm tractor or a piece of self propelled farm machinery and any equipment which at By Rose Hill ed to, being towed by, or furnished power from either, or any powe lawn mower, whether self-propelled or not. The policyp also covers any vehicle (auto or truck) or piece of far mmachinery which is required to be licensed under the state motor vehicle laws provided it is being used on farm premises at the time

If a Farm Buseau member for the coming year or his spouse in this county is killed in an accident arising out of use of a farm tractor or other pieces of machinery as deflend above, the beneficiary will re-ceive \$1000. If an unmarried child in the member's family under 21 years of age is killed, the beneficary will receive \$500. In both cases death must occur within 90 days

from the date of the accident. This type of coverage where an individual policy is being issued could not perhaps be supplied to you at a cost of less than approximutely \$10 to \$12 annually, However, your County Farin Bureau has been able to work out a contractual arrangement with the North Carolina Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company whereby this coverage be provided at no cost to the ember provided you renew your mbership for the coming year.
