## Beulaville Boy Fatally Injured While On Horse

Danny Malone Williams, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Vincent Williams, was fatally injured Tuesday afternoon when the horse he was riding was struck by an oil tanker on Highway 41 between Beulaville and Chinquapin.

He died several hours after the accident in Duplin General Hospital at Kenansville.

State Trooper Sam Briley said the Williams boy and a friend, Milo Pickett, 12, were riding horses on the shoulder of the highway, following another boy, Jerry Williams, who was riding a bicycle.

The Williams boy's horse shied suddenly and lunged in front of the tanker, which was operated by Thomas Marion Phipps, Rt. 1, Leland, the officer said. The truck is owned by Humphrey - Hardison Oil Co. of Deep Run.

Trooper Briley said his investigation showed it was clearly an unavoidable accident.

Funeral services for the youth were held at the Chinquapin Presbyterian Church Thursday at 3 p.m. by the Rev. Ira Rawles, a former pastor. Interment was in Devotional Gardens near Warsaw.

Surviving, in addition to his parents are his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Pearl Carter Bich of Richlands, and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. D. T. Williams of Beulaville.

## Time To Apply Gas Tax Refund

It is now time to apply for gas tax refund. The refund applies only for gas used for Non-highway purposes. One can apply for both Federal and State refunds between June 30 and September 30, 1962. The filing dates for Federal and State refunds were to be claimed on different periods of time, one for calendar year and one for Fiscal year. This made it easier to keep records straight. Your Farm Bureau has been working long and hard to get the law changed to simplify filing. It is estimated that if all the farmers in Duplin would file and get their refund for Duplin County alone, this amount of money could be used especially since there are so many overgrown crops. If you would like help with filing, come by your Farm Bureau Office in Kenansville, which has a calendar that is helpful for farmers to keep a record of the gas used, and in which equipment used, and date it was used. You may get one from the office.

Have you read the statistics on the safety of seat belts? Records show that the use of seat belts reduced fatal and serious injuries more than 50%. If you are thinking of getting seat belts, you will order them for you for \$3.90 per belt, this is about 1/2 the cost if they are bought retail.

Let's review a few of the many things that have been accomplished through Farm Bureaus.

Your Farm Bureau was instrumental in getting farm machinery tax in Duplin reduced by \$45,000 per year.

Your Farm Bureau helped get fuel oil tax removed saving Duplin County Farmers \$22,000 per year.

"Public Law 480 was developed by your Farm Bureau. This bill alone helped to move millions of dollars worth of goods that could not have been moved otherwise.

## Farm Bureau Now Offering Farm Tractor, Equipment Blanket Accident Policy

Duplin County Farm Bureau, this year will provide for you and other members of your family immediate coverage as stated above until September 1, 1963. This matter is being called to your attention in order to give you an opportunity to provide your family with this coverage during the summer months, while it is generally recognized that we will not conduct a regular membership enrollment until some time in the early fall," stated President Faywin J. Shaw.

For the purpose of this policy "farm tractor and farm equipment" are defined as a farm tractor or a piece of self propelled farm machinery and any equipment which at the time of the accident is attached to, being towed by, or furnished power from either, or any power lawn mower, whether self-propelled or not. The policy also covers any vehicle (auto or truck) or piece of farm machinery which is required to be licensed under the state motor vehicle laws provided it is being used on farm premises at the time of the accident.

If a Farm Bureau member for the coming year or his spouse in this county is killed in an accident arising out of use of a farm tractor or other pieces of machinery as defined above, the beneficiary will receive \$1000. If an unmarried child in the member's family under 21 years of age is killed, the beneficiary will receive \$500. In both cases death must occur within 90 days from the date of the accident.

This type of coverage where an individual policy is being issued could not perhaps be supplied to you at a cost of less than approximately \$10 to \$12 annually. However, your County Farm Bureau has been able to work out a contractual arrangement with the North Carolina Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company whereby this coverage can be provided at no cost to the member provided you renew your membership for the coming year.

## New East Duplin School Not Ready; Pupils Will Attend Same School As 1961"

The new East Duplin School will not open on August 21 as had been previously planned. The reason for this being that the auxiliary buildings, which are the lunchroom and Agriculture shop, are not complete. It will be necessary to use these buildings as eight teachers are to be located in them.

The Board of Education in a joint meeting with the School Committees of East Duplin, Beulaville, B. F. Grady, Chinquapin and Pottery Hill and the principals of the above schools, discussed the problems of opening from all angles. The East Duplin High School will be ready for occupancy on September 15, although it will not be complete, but the shop and lunchroom will not be ready on that date.

The student body will be large enough to tax the facilities of the entire plant and it will be impossible to operate the school in only the main building.

After the committee studied all the plans of operation, they met again with the Board of Education on July 26 and took the following action:

"The group voted unanimously to operate as in prior years until the entire plant is completed at East Duplin. Beulaville, B. F. Grady and Chinquapin High School students reporting to their respective schools as in former years and Pottery Hill Elementary students reporting to their own school."

"The matter of postponing the opening date of school for a week was discussed. It was decided to open as planned on August 21, the students to report for books, etc. on August 20."

All members of the Board of Education were present at this meeting.

Final payment under the 1962 Feed Grain Program will begin Wednesday, August 1, 1962. Participants in the 1962 Feed Grain Program are being asked to come to the county ASCS office to sign for final payments by communities so that they can receive their drafts while in the county office in a minimum of time.

In order for a participant to be eligible for final payment, he must certify (by signing in the county office Form ASCS-477-2, Application for Final Payment) that he has complied with all of the requirements of the 1962 Feed Grain Program and that the 1962 Feed Grain base on any farm in which the participant has an interest has not been exceeded.

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## Tobacco Demonstration To Be On Tues.

Vernon H. Reynolds, County Farm Agent, announced that plans have been made to hold two tobacco meetings on Tuesday, August 7.

The first meeting will be held on the farm of E. J. Summerlin at Summerlin's Crossroads at 5:00 P. M. A demonstration will be held at this time on control of Black Shank with chemicals for Coker 316 and Hicks tobacco on a plot treated with Manzate. Also for Coker 316 and Hicks on untreated soil.

Farmers who are interested in growing Hicks tobacco on farms which have black shank would be interested in seeing this demonstration. Manzate is giving good control of black shank but cost is not 100%.

The second meeting will be held on the same date will be on the farm of Harold McCullen, Oak Ridge Community, near the county building at 6:00 P. M. On this farm, farmers will have a chance to observe a variety demonstration which includes fifteen varieties of tobacco including several new black shank resistant varieties and also several experimental varieties that have not been released.

Reynolds invites all interested in tobacco to attend these meetings.

## VIA TELSTAR New Bern Mayor Talks With Berne Mayor

A history-making telephone call was completed last night when Dr. Dale T. Mills, mayor of New Bern, talked with Dr. Edward Fremmelier, mayor of Berne, Switzerland, via the Telstar satellite.

The telephone conversation, arranged by the United States Information Agency in cooperation with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and Carolina Telephone, was part of President Kennedy's "People-to-People" program.

The call was transmitted during the 152nd orbit of the Telstar satellite which was launched from Cape Canaveral on July 10. Since it went into orbit, Telstar has successfully relayed long distance calls and television programs between the United States and Europe. Future plans call for the launching of additional communications satellites to provide continuous circuits for voice and television relays via outer space.

Nearly \$50 million has already been invested by American Telephone and Telegraph Company in the research and development of the Telstar program. The 34 1/2-inch Telstar, which weighs 170 pounds, circles the earth every 156 minutes.

Telephone calls were also established on Thursday between twenty-two other cities in the United States and cities in Europe. New Bern, historically related to Berne, Switzerland, was the only city in the South selected to participate in this series of calls.

## Mack Broadhurst Hurt In Accident

Mack Broadhurst of route 2, Mount Olive, suffered broken ribs in a car-truck accident on rural road 1317, about 300 yards east of Calypso town limits Monday night of last week about 8 o'clock. He was treated at a local doctor's office and released.

State Trooper J. S. Briley said James Daniel Lambert, 38, of Calypso, drove a 1959 Ford out of a yard in front of the 1958 Ford pickup driven by Broadhurst, 48, who was traveling toward Calypso.

Lambert was charged with failing to yield the right of way.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$500 and \$600 for the truck.

From age 1 through 24, accidents are the leading cause of death. From age 25 up, diseases of the heart and blood vessels become the Number One killer, according to the National Office of Vital Statistics.

## FEED COMPANY SUED FOR TAX

State Agriculture Commissioner L. Y. Ballentine filed suit Monday in Wake Superior Court against a Duplin County firm that has allegedly failed to pay \$3,750 as a State feed inspection tax.

Ballentine charged that Nash Johnson and Sons' Farm Inc., operators of a Rose Hill feed mill, have failed to pay any of the 25-cents-a-ton tax since January 1.

The mill, he said, has meanwhile processed some 15,000 tons of feed and owes the State \$3,750. Ballentine is also asking for an additional \$375, which he says is 10 per cent late payment penalty.
