RAD Program Organized Friday

At a meeting held on Friday August 17, in Kenansville plans were made for a Rural Areas Development Program for Duplin County.
The purpose of the RAD program is for panel members to meet with various groups to explain Federal Aid to communities and to explain other Government Aid programs. The panel will work with the groups in planning surveys and in developing plans and assist in making surveys. The program will work very much like the S.W. England program in Eastern North Carolina.
The panel is made up of T. A. Parker, Jr., Farmers Home Administration; Walter Pedrona, A-15 Pest Control; George Penney, Soil Conservation Service; and T. W. Kuhn, ASAS Secretary. Many of the farm leaders and other interested persons were present at this program.
Marion Hoffman gave a talk on RAD, illustrated with slides as to the purpose of RAD and the objectives and results to be expected. Harry Thomas, REA representative, told of the assistance that REA can offer to communities and Jim Bunce, Assistant County Farm Agent, presented the Extension's five-year agricultural opportunities program. Many others spoke of the programs of Duplin County.
Community leaders present were urged to seek assistance of panel members in developing programs and carrying out the programs.

Duplin Farmers Expect To Market \$14,000,000 Tobacco Crop This Year

Forty-four hundred Tobacco Growers in Duplin County are anxiously awaiting the opening of Wallace and other Eastern Belt Tobacco Markets on August 21. Duplin Tobacco Growers expect to market \$14,000,000 tobacco crop from their 16,142 allotted acres in 1962. The 1962 allotment is 681 acres more than the 1961 allotment of 15,461 acres.
Most of the tobacco crops in Duplin County looked very good in June and most of farmers were expecting to produce over a ton per acre, then on June 29, a Tropical Storm moved in with high winds and heavy rain. The high winds continued a day and a half and most of the Tobacco was blown down. Heavy rains fell daily until July 4. Many acres in the county had 20 inches of rain in a five day period. About one-third of the Tobacco was drowned and it flopped for several

Commissioners Meet Jointly And Discuss Relief For Flood Conditions Of NE

Application was made for Federal Funds for the Corps of Engineers to re-examine the Northeast River Basin and to report finding and recommendations as to what can be done to eliminate flooding.

Congressman Henderson assured the group that he would do everything he could to get a study of the problem launched.

FHA Loaned \$835,050 Past Year In Duplin

The Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture loaned farm families and other rural people in Duplin County a record total of \$835,050 in fiscal 1962 which ended on June 30, Bertie A. Parker, Jr., County Supervisor, announced today.
The volume of loans in this county, largest during any 12-month period in the local office's history, was nine percent larger than the 1961 total of \$767,570 and 59 percent above the \$344,190 loaned in 1960.
Nearly one-third of the total loaned during fiscal 1962 went for farm operating expenses and two-thirds for the purchase, development or enlargement of family farms and for the construction and improvement of houses and service buildings on farms and in rural communities.
Approximately 215 local families were using Farmers Home Administration credit for these and other purposes at the end of the fiscal year compared to 170 the year before.
Collections of principal and interest totaled \$377,817 in 1962 compared with \$277,938 in 1961 and \$308,342 in 1960.
Three recent improvements more adequately equipped the Farmers Home Administration to meet farm credit needs in 1962 according to Parker: A positive, vigorous policy toward the promotion and preservation of the family farm; broad expansion of the agency's programs by the Agricultural and Housing Acts of 1961; and an increase in the supply of appropriated and insured funds.
"Farmers are requiring larger amounts of credit each year," Parker said. "For example, ten years ago (Continued On Back)

Sinclair Dies In Auto Wreck

A Duplin County man was killed and three other persons injured Sunday afternoon when a compact car swerved into another automobile on US 701 about three miles south of Clinton. The death was Sampson County's 15th traffic fatality this year.
Dead is John C. Sinclair, Jr., 26, Route 5, Faison driver of the small car.
Injured are James Stanton King, 41, operator of the other car, and Thomas W. Murray, 14, both of Durham, and Robert Brown, 15, Route 2, Faison.
State Trooper D. W. Williams said the southbound Sinclair car swerved into the left lane and collided head-on with the northbound King auto about 2:15 p. m.
All four persons were rushed to Sampson Memorial Hospital here where Sinclair died four hours later.
King and Murray, both of whom suffered leg injuries, were treated and transferred to a Durham hospital late Sunday night. Brown was given emergency treatment for a broken collar bone.
Trooper Williams said both cars were completely demolished in the smash-up.
