Once each year the people of Duplin County are called upon to provide a vital and effective Scouting program for the youth of the county. This program is available to all boys, without limitations. Rich boys, poor boys, city boys, or rural boys — all benefit from participation in Scouting. It serves boys of all races & all religions beliefs, and breeds a character building program designed to supplement and complement the teachings of the church, the home, and the school. Scouting builds physically fit bodies and morally fit souls. It can be brought to your boys only through your generous financial support.

Counting in some form — either the younger boy program of Cubbing, the Boy Scout program for boys 11, 12, 13, or the older Explorer program is available and flourishing in the following Duplin Communities: Albertson, Charity, Magnolia, Warsaw, Calypso, Faison, Rose Hill, Wallace, Chinguapin, Kenansville, Potters Hill, Pinhook, Pink Hill (RFD).

- 1. Training Adult leaders.
- 2. Executive service to provide help to leaders throughout the year.
- 3. Summer camps where boys are taught to swim, row, and care for themselves under all circumstances in the water. They are also taught handicraft of many kinds, nature study, conservation, first aid, physical fitness, of many kinds, nature study, conservation first aid physical fitness, marksmanship, archery, and a host of other skills.
- 4. Advancement awards which tend to stimulate study along pre-vocational lines.
- 5. A council office to serve as a service station to boys and leaders.

- 7. The provision of adequate literature to help Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Explorer Advisors, Den Mothers, and other workers in Scouting get the job done.

There are now 185 Cub Scouts, and Explorers enjoying the benefits of Scouting in Duplin County. To give leadership to this fine group of boys, there are 169 adult leaders who give of their time, talent and money to get the job done. Duplin Scouts were in attendance at Scout Summer Camp this year for a total of 194 children.

Mrs. Grover Septon, District Director for the North Carolina Congress of Parents and Teachers, has announced plans for the annual District Conference, a conference for all PTA members in District 8. District 8 is comprised of the following counties: Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland Duplin, New Hanover, Pender, Robeson, and Sampson. This conference will be held on October 4 in the Wallace-Rose Hill High School Rose Hill, N. C.

The over-all theme of the Conference will be "Count Down to Success in Parent Education." Reynolds, Kenansville, Curtis Cates - Faison and others are giving leadership to this Campaign. Duplin General South Wing To Open Dedication Ceremony To Be Held Oct. 14

Formal opening and dedication of the South Wing of Duplin General Hospital will be held on October 14. The South Wing will be open for inspection between three and five o'clock with a brief dedicatory ceremony held in the Court Room. Many representatives from the State Board of Medical Care will be here. The South Wing has been watched with much interest by the State Board of Health.

Dr. L. U. Chandler, administrator of Duplin General Hospital stated, "The South Wing will remain a part of the Duplin General Hospital and will not be a separate unit, but will render care similar to or better than a nursing home. Cost will be about 28 per cent less than in the same type room in the hospital."

3rd. Congressional District Democratic Rally To Be Held In Beaufort, Oct. 10

The Third Congressional District Democratic Rally will be held in Beaufort at the Beaufort Graded School on Tuesday, October 10. The rally will begin at about five-thirty and supper will be served at six or six-thirty.

Senator Sam Irvin will be principal speaker, introduced by Congressman David Henderson. Governor Sanford, members of the Council of State, State Legislators, Candidates for each of the counties, Tom Davis, William W. Staton, Bert Bennett and many others are expected to attend.

Powell Fund Allocations

RALEIGH - The allocation of \$7,629,882.79 in Powell Bill funds to 413 participating municipalities was announced today by the State Highway Commission. The funds are distributed annually to qualified cities and towns for use in non-highway system street work within their corporate limits. Checks to the individual municipalities will be mailed from Raleigh the latter part of this month in order that they will reach municipalities by October 1.

Powell Bill allocations are based on a formula using the population and street mileage in the municipalities and the total allocation this year represents an increase over 1961 of \$273,746.82.

In the twelve years of Powell Bill allocations, a total of \$73,786,948.84 has been distributed, and the group of participating municipalities has grown from 386 to 413 with five additional municipalities still under consideration. Individual allocations for participating municipalities in Duplin are:
