Telephone Bills To Change In Looks

Telephone subscribers in Beaufort and Kenansville will soon notice a change in the appearance of their monthly telephone statements.

U. G. Daughtridge, local manager for Carolina Telephone, said that the newly designed statements will be used here with billing periods ending October 3, 1962.

Although the new bill will show the charges for local service and those for long distance service separately, the entire statement will consist of an oblong hinged electronic accounting card.

In addition, a return envelope will be enclosed with each statement for use by subscribers who wish to pay by mail.

Commenting on the change, Daughtridge stated, "The revised statement is the product of electronic equipment recently installed in our Accounting Department. We think that the new statement will be easier to read and understand."

What Questions Vets Are Asking

Here are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to questions from former servicemen and their families:

Q - Can the Veterans Administration pay for emergency treatment of the service-connected conditions of veterans in private hospitals?

A - Yes, provided the medical emergency was such that an attempt to obtain admission to a VA hospital would have been hazardous to the veteran and if the emergency treatment is reported to the nearest VA hospital or regional office within 72 hours after the veteran's admission to the private hospital.

Q - Is the U. S. veterans population growing or declining at present?

A - Latest VA figures show the U. S. veteran population declined 127,000 during the 12 months preceding August 1, 1962.

Arc Welding, Poultry Courses To Be Offered

The Goldsboro Industrial Education Center has announced that it will conduct classes in electric arc welding and poultry this fall.

Classes in electric arc welding begin Tuesday night, Oct. 23 at 7 p. m. and will continue on Tuesday and Thursday nights throughout the fall quarter. The course features fundamental skills, metal characteristics, and selection of welding materials.

A registration fee of \$10 will be the only cost involved. Welding material will be furnished.

The poultry course will start Wednesday, Oct. 10 with classes on Monday and Wednesday nights from 7-9 p. m. The course is designed to be helpful to feed salesmen, service men, hatchery men, and medication and equipment salesmen. The first course will deal with diseases and parasites.

ASCS Announces Diverted Acreage Restrictions Eased

Effective Nov. 1, ASCS will permit farmers to graze acreage which was previously diverted from production of cash crops under the 1962 feed grain program or the 1962 wheat stabilization program. According to Mr. O. L. Holland, Chairman of the Duplin ASC County Committee, this is part of a general effort to keep provisions of farm programs in line with practical farming operations.

Holland cautioned farmers that this grazing authorization applies to all acreage diverted under the feed grain and wheat program except wildlife food plots and other special cases.

Many farmers normally salvage dropped corn ears and other crop residue by turning livestock on harvested cropland in the late fall. On many farms the diverted acreage is not fenced separately. This change will permit these farmers to do this without being put to unreasonable work time and expense for protection fencing.

The main objective of the ban against livestock on diverted acres is to prevent grazing that might partially offset the corn, grain sorghums, and wheat adjustment under the program. With killing frosts likely by Nov. 1, in the main grain-producing area, Holland said the objective of the no-grazing ban would be satisfactorily met by that time.
