

Ferree Speaks To Carrboro Group

Carrboro, Sept. 30 .- A. I. Ferree of Asheboro, Republican candidate for the United States senate, making the initial campaign speech in Orange county last Friday night at the Carrboro school, called upon his Republican friends to bestir themselves in the interest of the party between now and voting day, November 7. "One inspired soul preaching the doctrine of Republicanism seven days to the week year in and year out could make the party a strong contender county and perhaps overturn the Democratic majorities regularly returned in the county," he said.

Candidate Ferree was introduced to his audience of Republicans by Oscar J. Coffin, Democratic precinct chairman - "the first time in all my campaigning (since 1912) that I've been presented by a Democrat", said Ferree, Coffin and Ferree are both natives of Randolph county and it was as a fellow fownsmen and former associate that Coffin fitted for the office he seeks."

It was largely a oneman inspiration that worked in his county, he said, and his plea to Orange Republicans was to catch some of the same spirit in this election.
