of the seventh drive April 9, this meaning that the overall quota of \$574,000 has been oversubscribed by \$325,000. Total purchases by individuals have reached \$560,000. Of this amount \$295.000 is in E Bonds, leaving \$163,000 to go in order to meet

the \$458,000 E Bond quota before the close of the drive July 7, two weeks from now. Orange county is doing better than the state as a whole in the E. Bond campaign. Up to June 18, E sales in the state were reported at \$31,300,000, only 58 per cent

of the \$53,500,000 quota. In a person appeal through Chairman Sanders to the people of Orange county, C. T. Lienbach, chairman of the North Carolina War Finance Committee, urged them to buy as many E Bonds as they possibly could in the next two weeks to put the county over the top in its E.
