Mrs. William White won low score for the night and Mrs. Hughes had average. Guest of honor was won by Mrs. James Webb.

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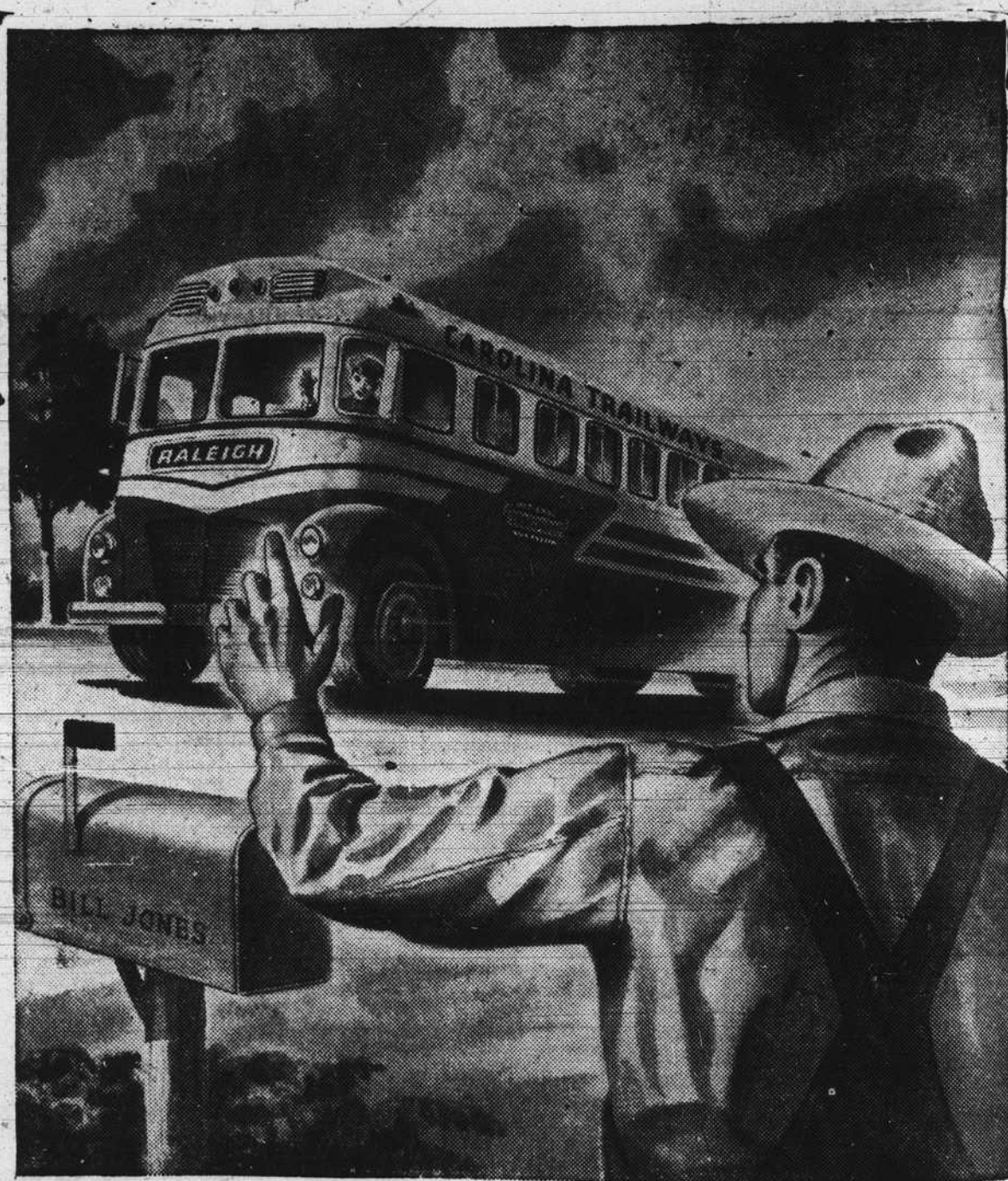
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
