Carrboro Is Seeking Postmaster

A Civil Service examination has been announced for filling the vacancy of postmaster at Carrboro. To be eligible, an applicant must have resided within the town for at least one year prior to the date set for close of receipt of application, August 28. Age limits are 21 to 63 years, except in the case of veterans.

The forms necessary to be filed are Application Form 10, Physical Fitness Form 13, and Instruction Form 2223. Veterans will need, in addition, Forms 14 and 4719. These forms may be obtained from the post office at Carrboro, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Anyone interested should execute these forms properly and mail them to the Commission at Washington, D. C., not later than August 28.
