Two types of loans will be made tural experience and training. Loans can be made for the purchase, development and improvement of family-type farms. The interest rate is 31/2 percent and loans are repayable over a 40-year period. A variable repayment plan Warden Seeks will make it possible for borrowers to make larger than average payments in years when farm income is high or above normal, and less than average payments in years when farm income is below

Production and subsistence loans, the second type, will be made to farmers and stockmen for the purchase of livestock, farm equipment, seed, fertilizer and other farm and home needs. Such loans can be made to either owners or tenants who live on and operate family-type farms and who derive the major portion of their income from farming. These loans carry an interest rate of 5 per cent and are repayable in from one to five years.
