## 3 Prisoners Escape Camp

Three prisoners escaped from the Orange county prison camp near Hillsboro Monday afternoon. They were: Raster Brody, serving 10 years for carnal knowledge, who walked away from the prison farm. He was an honor grade prisoner, age 36, and is believed headed for his home in Randolph county.

The other men escaped from a gang cutting a right of way near Dodson's Cross Roads. They are R. O. Lewis, sentenced from New Hanover county for 5-8 years for highway robbery, and Hasey Mitchell, sentenced 2-5 years from Caldwell county for forgery.

All of the men are believed heading for the counties from which they were sentenced.

## Warden Seeks Plot To Erect Fire Tower

Better forest fire protection for Orange county will be secured if the county can buy or lease land on top of the mountain near the waterworks on which an 80-foot fire tower can be erected, P. H. Johns, county fire warden, told the commissioners in their meeting Monday.

Johns said that the \$2,200 tower was in Hillsboro and that the state was willing to pay the \$1,800 cost of erection if the county could secure either a deed or a lease to a plot of land on top of the highest of three hills which skirt Hillsboro. The highest is nearest the water plant. Johns told the commissioners. The commissioners indicated that they would make an effort to secure the land.

### FSA Changes Name; FHA Takes Over

The Farmers' Home Administration, as authorized by the Congress, began operation in North Carolina November 1, says Bernice E. Strickland, FSA supervisor for Orange county, who recently attended a meeting at Asheville of personnel who will direct the affairs of the new agency. FHA replaces both the Farm Security Administration and the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan section of Farm Credit Administration, and takes over the personnel and assets of both agencies. Mr. Strickland said that for the time being FHA offices will be maintained with the same personnel at all points where FSA and ECFL have operated. Both agencies have made loans to small farmers and the new agency will continue to serve this group.

Also attending the meeting at Asheville was Mrs. Julia C. Davis, FSA home supervisor. Discussions were led by J. B. Slack, state director for Farmers' Home Administration.

Two types of loans will be made by Farmers' Home Administration, Mr. Strickland said. Farm purchase loans will be made to tenants, sharecroppers, farm laborers, and veterans with agricultural experience and training. Loans can be made for the purchase, development and improvement of family-type farms. The interest rate is 3½ percent and loans are repayable over a 40-year period. A variable repayment plan will make it possible for borrowers to make larger than average payments in years when farm income is high or above normal, and less than average payments in years when farm income is below normal.

Production and subsistence loans, the second type, will be made to farmers and stockmen for the purchase of livestock, farm equipment, seed, fertilizer and other farm and home needs. Such loans can be made to either owners or tenants who live on and operate family-type farms and who derive the major portion of their income from farming. These loans carry an interest rate of 5 percent and are repayable in from one to five years.

### PLEDGE SORORITY

"Thank goodness we are growing tobacco instead of cotton" has been the feeling of a number of farm leaders and farmers in Orange county during the past two weeks which has seen the cotton market go down while tobacco prices have been holding steady with lower prices being reported in only a few instances. Continued high prices have been reported on practically all tobacco markets in this section. Tobacco men in Mebane Monday said that a number of piles were going for as high as 70 cents. Many averages in the 60-cent brackets were being secured on the market there.

Whereas this was true on tobacco markets, cotton farmers throughout the south were experiencing a severe jolt with the drop in prices. In the eastern part of North Carolina where larger acreages of cotton are grown than in Orange county, a number of farmers have lost heavily.

In Orange county only a small amount of cotton is grown and marketed and it affects the overall economy of the farmer in the county very little.

Many dairy farmers in the county have also experienced an increase in price for their milk.

Price per 100 pounds of milk has increased from \$5.80 to \$6.00 and dairies in Chapel Hill and Durham have announced increases in prices for their milk, pointing out that they are passing the two cents per quart on to the farmer. Milk in Chapel Hill and Durham has advanced from 20 to 22 cents per quart.

### WESTERN UNION SERVICE CRITICIZED

A report was made from Chapel Hill this week that better western union service had been promised there for the business houses and residents. Recently, the report said, "a great deal of complaining concerning the service" had been made.

## 2,500 Votes Are Cast As Democrats Sweep General Election Returns In Orange County

### State Senator Congressman Leads Ticket

Carl T. Durham of Chapel Hill was returned to Congress by the Sixth District comprising Orange, Durham, Alamance and Guilford counties.

H. J. Walker, above, of Hillsboro, Democratic candidate for coroner, led the ticket with a total of 2,018 votes.

## Walker, Webb, Murdock Pace County Slate

With approximately 2,500 votes cast in the county, Orange county Democrats Tuesday returned all their candidates to county offices in an off-year election which saw Republicans the country over gain important seats in Congress and state governments.

H. J. Walker, running opposed for coroner, polled the highest number of votes with 2,018 being cast in his favor. William C. Murdock, of Durham, solicitor, with 1964 and James Webb of Hillsboro, named to represent Orange and Alamance counties in the State senate, with 1953 votes were next high on the ticket.

**PARKER GOP HIGH**  
Luther Parker, who unsuccessfully opposed Sam Latta for sheriff, was high man on the Republican ticket with 845 votes. Next high was H. H. (Jack) Brown of Hillsboro who received 799 votes for one of the three county commissioner seats.

The race for sheriff, clerk of court, register of deeds, state representative, and county commissioners were contested by the Republicans in the election.

Sam Latta in the sheriff's race defeated Parker 1892 to 845. Edwin Lynch in the clerk's race polled 1904 votes in returning to office with a majority of 1189 votes over Max C. Weaver of Chapel Hill.

J. Ed Laws ran up a 1183 majority over Fred H. Woods of Hillsboro for the register of deeds job.

In the commissioner race Collier Cobb, Jr., led the ticket with 1851 votes. Ben F. Wilson was second with 1818 votes and H. G. Laws third with 1787.

John W. Umstead of Chapel Hill rolled up a 1881 to 697 victory over J. R. Evans for the state house of representatives position.

## Lions Favor Rigid Highway Regulations

A recent poll among members of the Hillsboro Lions club reveals that they favor more rigid laws governing the licensing of motorists in the state as an avenue for controlling the increasing number of deaths and injuries resulting from highway accidents.

The questions presented to the members of the club included three on highway subjects; one on an action taken by the commissioners; one on a recent decision of the Hillsboro Merchants Association; and one on the town charter of Hillsboro.

The first question was: would you favor a law that would make it mandatory that a driver's license be revoked for (a) two years on second conviction for drunken driving and (b) permanently on third conviction for drunken driving.

Answers were: (a) yes 100 percent; (b) yes 70 percent, no 30 percent.

The second question: would you favor a law that would make it mandatory that a driver's license be revoked for 90 days on first conviction for careless and reckless driving and for 12 months for any later conviction for careless and reckless driving? Answers were: yes 91 percent, no 9 percent.

The third question dealing on highway regulations was: would you favor reducing the speed limit on our highway. A "no" answer was 100 percent against reducing the speed limit.

## Farm Bureau Meets Monday At Aycock

A farm bureau meeting will be held November 11 at 7:30 at the Aycock school house for the purpose of organizing a campaign for new members and to discuss sentiment of tobacco growers on production and acreage for next year.

Discussion of sending delegates to the national convention in San Francisco in early December will also be held. A special train is expected to carry 350 North Carolina members to the meeting.

Chapel Hill.—Commander Richard H. (Dick) O'Kane, husband of Mrs. Ernestine Groves O'Kane, of Chapel Hill has been awarded the old Star in lieu of a third Silver Star medal, according to an announcement from Secretary of the Navy Forrestal.

Comdr. O'Kane, of Durham, Vt., visited here in the spring upon his return from submarine duty in the Pacific. He was accompanied by Mrs. O'Kane, daughter of the late Professor Ernest R. Groves, world famous authority on marriage and the home.

## Telephone Company To Ask Increase In Local Rates

The Morris Telephone Company—the company serving Hillsboro—has requested the State Utilities Commission for permission to increase the rates in Hillsboro \$1 per month.

Hearing on the petition will be held November 29 in Raleigh. Under the petition as presented by the Morris Telephone Company they are asking for the increase because of the increase service to be offered by the installation of a dial system here.

Business rates under the plan would be increased from \$3.25 to \$4.25 and one-party residential rates from \$2.25 to \$3.25.
