Only six of 35 Orange county school buses inspected by T. P. Hofler in a periodic inspection last week were pronounced in good condition by the highway patrolman, his the Orange county welfare departreport to the grand jury reveals.

Poor conditions ranging from needed repairs to light switches to bad brakes on one bus serving Chapel-Hill white statement: schools were uncovered by Hofler, in his inspection.

Hofler in his inspection was the lack of lights on the buses. Twenty-three of the buses have only one In Contest light, no lights or their lights are in need of repair, Hofler reported to the grand jury.

Bus No. 33—which serves the Chapel Hill white school—was reported by Hofler to be in such a poor condition that he recommended the bus be taken out of service. His report showed that this particular bus had no lights, that the brakes were in working order on Good Health Association. only one wheel and that the driver reported to him the brakes would not hold when the bus was loaded. "This bus should be taken off the road," the highway patrolman as-




