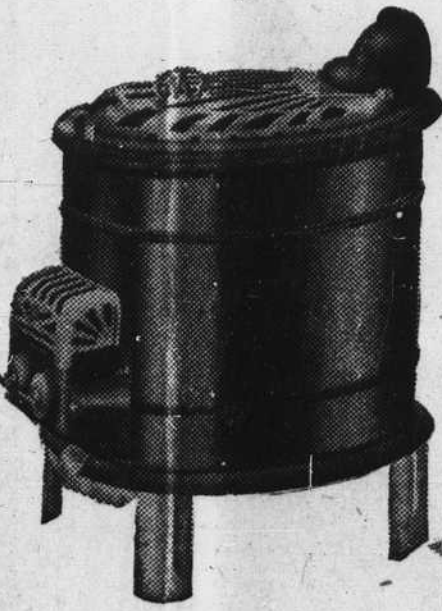
Mrs. Herman Brown explained the discipline of the Methodist church.

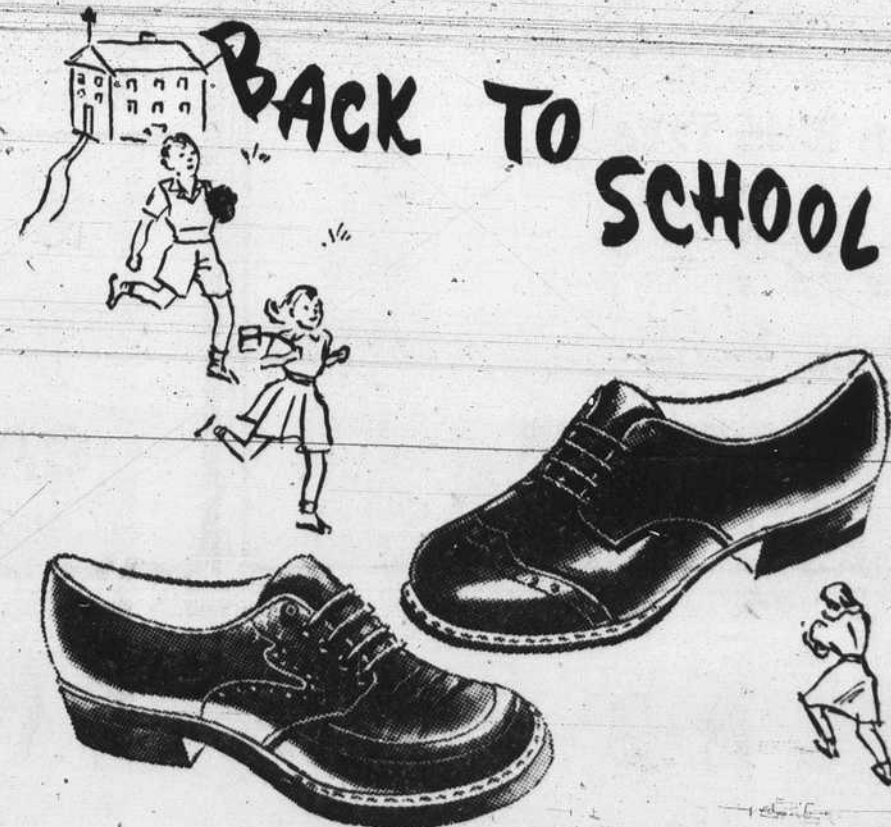
