Orange county is in woodland. timber has been cut, leaving a stand of mixed hardwood and some small pines. The problem confronting most farmers is how to manage this cut over woodland containing a large percentage of hardwood trees. The Crosse Lumber company has arrived on a 10year experiment on a 40-acre cut over mixed hardwood forest by cutting the hard wood into cord wood and thinning the young able to harvest 81/2 cords of wood and 588 board feet of saw logs per acre, besides leaving on the feet more than at the start. At the end of this 10-year period of selective cutting, the hardwoods were almost completely eliminated and the young growing pines were
