**Orange Aids In Purchase Of Equipment**

Chapel Hill—Five-county chapters of the North Carolina division of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the Durham area have entered into a co-operative arrangement for the purchase of equipment for the use in treatment of infantile paralysis in this section, it was announced here today by Philip S. Randolph, state representative.

The counties are Caswell, Chatham, Durham, Orange and Person, and each is contributing on a pro rata of population basis.

A new dome-type respirator or iron lung and two hot-pack machines will be purchased by the counties. The iron lung, Randolph explained, will be stored at the Durham Fire department and one hot-pack machine each at Duke and Watts hospitals.

## Poultry Research Plant Nears End Of Construction

Completion of a \$32,000 poultry research plant at the Coastal Plain Test Farm near Willard will be celebrated with a Poultry Day Program on Thursday, April 15. It has been announced by Dr. Charles Dearing, assistant director of the test farm.

The program will start at 10 A. M., Dr. Dearing said, and will consist of talks by leading poultry authorities and demonstrations by members of the test farm staff. Visitors will also be given an opportunity to inspect the new poultry research plant, constructed with a view to promoting a greater poultry industry in the southeastern counties as well as for general poultry research work.

Two buildings for the new poultry plant were completed a year ago and three others have been under construction during the past winter. Other work has been under way to clear and grade land in the vicinity of the project, to provide water and electricity, and to fence the poultry runs. Workmen now are busy trying to complete the project in time for the Poultry Day program.
