## Heavy Poultry Losses Reported From New Disease

Hillsboro—An outbreak of Newcastle disease in several poultry flocks in the St. Mary's-Schley area has resulted in heavy losses, according to information here this week.

The infection, imported from other areas and spread in numerous ways, killed 360 out of 500 in the worst affected flock reported while the incidence of mortality of the disease in other flocks was in the neighborhood of two per cent.

Recommendations of the county agent after consultation with State Department of Agriculture authorities are:

"1. If you live within one mile of any of these outbreaks, you should consider vaccination immediately.

"2. There are two types of vaccine available.

"a. Live vaccine will infect the premises the same as an outbreak of the disease. This vaccine is supposed to produce life immunity. Its use requires a permit from the State Veterinarian. It is easy to use and may be administered rapidly. It is not recommended to be used on birds in production as it will usually stop them from laying.

"b. The killed virus vaccine will not infect the premises, but produces only temporary immunity 4-5 months. It is recommended to get a flock through present danger of infection. A syringe is required to give this vaccine, however, the process is simple. This vaccine may be used on birds in production without seriously checking them. This vaccine can also be used on day-old chicks. The cost is cheap. This vaccine is probably the one to use where the disease has not been present.

"Flock owners should not visit diseased flocks. All dead birds should be either burned or buried."

## Large Crowd At New Sharon For Dedication

New Sharon—An estimated crowd of approximately 800 people from all parts of the county and outside its bounds were present to witness the twin observance of homecoming and dedication of New Sharon Church last Sunday.

In the 11 o'clock services the scripture was read by G. A. Brown; the introduction of the speaker was made by Rev. Charles S. Hubbard, and the main address was presented by Dr. J. M. Ormand. Dr. Ormand preached on the "Purpose of the Church." After the main address the presentation, naming and acceptance of the church was given by the minister and people, with W. J. Smith representing the people. A two-hour intermission for a fellowship lunch on the grounds immediately followed the morning service.

In the afternoon service the dedication of individual memorials and organ ensued. Raymond Weaver, church school superintendent, presented the memorials and Reid Roberts presented the organ for the people. A brief address was given by Rev. Charles S. Hubbard. A dedicatory concert of the organ concluded the program.

The strategy of the majority soon became evident also when Alonzo Kenion, as soon as the meeting got underway, moved to table the report of the nominating committee appointed by Commander Forrest dispense with all other business and proceed with nominations and election from the floor. ## County Approves Bonds

Hillsboro—With something over 4,100 Orange County citizens going to the polls, the county last Saturday approved the spending of \$200,000,000 for N. C. rural roads improvement by a majority of 707 votes and overwhelmingly voted to issue \$25,000,000 in school building bonds.

The total vote was 2,450 to 1,743 in favor of the road bonds and 3,296 to 879 for school bonds in the 16 precincts.

Heaviest votes against the road bonds came in the Hillsboro precinct where the proposed issue was defeated 478 to 278. The bonds carried by only two votes in Chapel Hill. University was the only precinct voting against both issues.
