Hillsboro-With something over 4,100 Orange County citizens going to the polls, the county last Saturday approved the spending of \$200,000,000 for N. C. rural roads improvement by a majority of 707 votes and overwhelmingly voted to issue \$25,000,000 in school building bonds.

The total vote was 2,450 to 1,743 in favor of the road bonds and 3,296 to 879 for school bonds in the 16 precincts.
