Negro Brothers Plan New Dairy At Hurdle Mills

Hurdle Mills—Reginald and Nathaniel Villines, young Negro farmers of Hurdle Mills, are planning a new 20-cow grade A dairy, according to C. J. Ford, Negro farm agent in Person County for the SState College Extension Service. The two are sons of the late Nat Villines.

The boys already have a good start on their dairy enterprise, says Ford. They seeded about 25 acres of pasture this fall. They also have plenty of room in a new four-thousand-dollar barn to house the 18 or 20 cows they want. At present they have four good cows, are asking County Agent Ford to help them locate other good animals.

The Villines brothers will continue to grow sweet potatoes, which was the main standby for their families while he was alive. They harvested 700 bushels of sweets this year, 90 per cent of which were Grade A.

Nathaniel will finish his studies at A. & T. College next spring with a degree in agriculture. He is gathering all the information he can in connection with dairying and other enterprises on the farm.

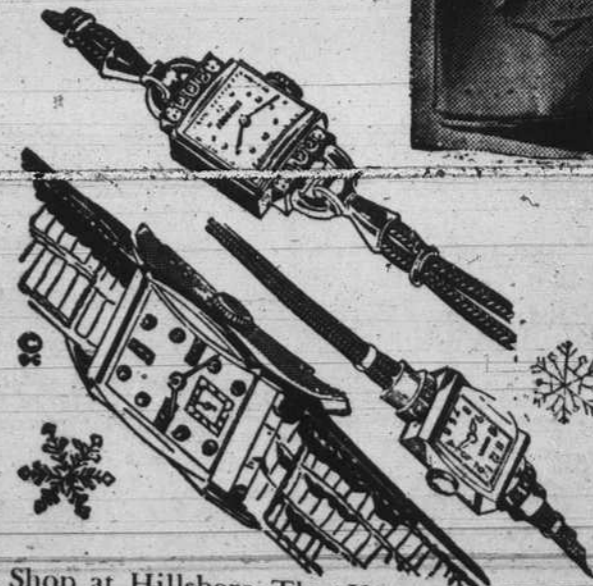

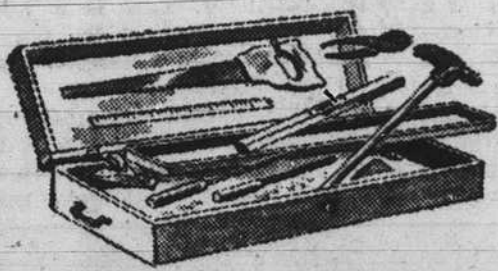

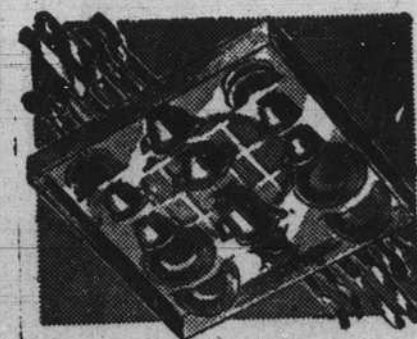
