John Cameron, director of the State Board's Division of Surveys and Field Services, said that after a survey, "we recommended that no pupils be taken from Hillsboro to Aycock. We didn't think it fair to take students from a bigger school (Hillsboro) to one that inevitably will falter and die a natural death." He said his division felt Aycock eventually will become consolidated with Hills-

boro. In their appearance before the State board, delegations from Hillsboro and Aycock reiterated the positions previously taken in public meetings here before the

Orange County School Board.
