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Man Kills Wife in Cold Blood

Hillsboro—A 27-year-old Negro Cheeks Township shot and killed his wife in cold blood Friday night as she sat talking to other women at a neighbor's house. Tomorrow, farm laborer, arrested approximately 50 minutes after the murder and admitted the shooting of his wife, Eloise Hardcastle Morrow, although no one saw him at the scene.

The shooting occurred at the home of John Riley near Cheeks Township at approximately 10 o'clock. According to witnesses, a woman was sitting talking to neighbors when shots were fired through the door, taking effect in her left shoulder and back. She slumped in her chair and died instantly, probably from a broken neck.

Deputy Sheriff Rainey Roberts, called to the scene of the shooting, arrived some 50 minutes after the shooting at the home of her brother near Mebane, where he had gone to change clothes. According to Roberts, Morrow admitted firing the shots through the doorway at the time of her arrest and after a night in jail here accompanied Sheriff's deputies back to the vicinity of the crime to retrieve the shotgun from the weeds into which he had thrown it in his flight from the scene.

Morrow and his wife had recently separated, the wife living with her father and Morrow living in a sawmill shack in the same area. Both had recently been to the Sheriff's offices in connection with a previous argument in which Morrow had accused his wife of having immoral relations with her father.

The Morrow woman at the time of the killing was on probation from a prison term she was serving for murdering a previous husband in Pennsylvania.

How Planetarium Works Is Theme Of Next Show

Chapel Hill — Answering the many questions of visitors who come to watch the regular performances, the next showing in the Morehead Planetarium in Chapel Hill will be "How The Planetarium Works."

The first performance will be given on Tuesday night, October 3, at 8:30, and presentations will be at the same hour every night and at 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays, through October 23.

Expected to be of particular interest to the many visitors who will come from distant places for the inaugural exercises when Gordon Gray officially takes over the reins of the University, this new exhibition will reveal many behind the scenes features of the great instrument and its operation. The technical staff, headed by Anthony F. Jenzano, has built many pieces of special equipment for illustrative material.

The tricky eyelid that must be built into each of the more than 100 separate projectors of the instrument, to keep stars and planets from shining on the floors and laps of the visitors, will be demonstrated and explained, and the strange icosahedron that was chosen as the basis for the projection distribution of the stars will be fully demonstrated.

Of interest to many will be the revelation of the way in which such spectacles as "Star of Bethlehem" and "Trip to the Moon" are accomplished. The stainless steel dome, with its 19,000 holes, will be shown to be transparent under proper lighting.

Because of the many special guests at the inaugural ceremonies, casual visitors are urged to avoid attending the performances on the night of October 9 when a reception for President and Mrs. Gray will be held in the Morehead Building.

Driver Found Not Guilty In Bus Accident Case

Chapel Hill — Henry Walker Baldwin, 59-year-old Negro, charged with reckless driving and property damage in connection with an accident involving a school bus Monday, was found not guilty in Recorder's Court here Tuesday.

The accident occurred about 5 miles west of Carrboro on NC 54. Baldwin was driving a 1947 flatbody truck, loaded with heavy pine logs, which went out of control as it came down a hill and grazed the side of a school bus loaded with 18 Negro children on their way home. The truck turned over after traveling about 25 feet beyond the impact. Baldwin and his nephew, Howard Stephen Baldwin, crawled out of the truck unhurt. The damage to the school bus amounted to a dented side, while the truck damage was estimated to be about \$200. A senior high school student, Roy Oldham, was driving the school bus.

The officers investigating the accident were E. E. Parnell of the State Highway Patrol and J. A. Williams and W. F. Hester of the Carrboro Police Department.

Walker Fails To Gain Freedom When "New Evidence" Does Not Materialize

Hillsboro — Joseph Frederick "Peewee" Walker's appeal for a new trial, which succeeded in getting him off the roads for the hearing of alleged new evidence, failed to alter his previous conviction on a drunken driving charge two weeks ago, despite the urgent appeals of veterans training personnel who pled for his release.

Phipps ordered Walker released from the camp under bond pending the hearing on the new evidence.

Hillsboro — B. Everett Jordan, chairman of the State Democratic Executive committee, has notified Democratic officials in Orange County this week that the Democratic Rally for the Sixth Congressional District will be held at the Guilford Courthouse in Greensboro, on Tuesday, Oct. 26.

The sixth district includes Durham, Orange, Alamance, and Guilford counties. Carl T. Durham of Chapel Hill is congressman.

Jordan stated that it is expected that Senator Clyde Hoey, senator-nominate Willis Smith, Governor Kerr Scott, and members of the council of state will be present at the rally, which is the last party convocation to be held prior to the general election on Nov. 7.

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Chapel Hill — Long range improvements were the order of the day for the Town Board of Aldermen at the regular Monday meeting as the group took under consideration various improvements including sidewalk paving, more insurance, and surveys of the town.

Another body blow to the traditional setting of Chapel Hill was struck when the Board took under consideration a proposal to pave sidewalks in certain areas of the town. The aldermen asked the streets committee to consider the matter further in the light of costs estimate of the project, given by Tom Rose, Town Manager.

Rose reported that construction of the sidewalks, 9 feet wide of a cement and earth mixture would cost \$1 a lineal foot or \$3 a lineal foot for the usual cement walks. The streets committee expects to discuss the matter with persons and parties whose property abuts on the sidewalks under consideration. The sidewalks mentioned were: both sides of the street from Spencer Hall on Franklin Street to the intersection with Columbia St. at the Baptist Church corner, both sides of Columbia from Stroud's garage to the intersection with Rosemary at the Town Hall. The Streets' committee is expected to bring a definite proposal before the board at a future meeting.

The Town Manager recommended that the finance committee of the board consider a proposal to buy comprehensive liability insurance for the town in addition to the workmen's compensation, auto liability, and fire insurance already in force. The board acting on Rose's recommendation, forwarded the proposal to the finance committee.

The Town Manager also reported that a survey of the town's limits before the annexation is about completed and that the survey is revealing that considerable property in Chapel Hill has for a long time been regarded as outside of the town's limits.

The Aldermen authorized the town manager to report to the Board as soon as possible a cost estimate of putting radius curving at the intersection of Ransom and W. Cameron Streets, at the intersection of Mallett and East Franklin Street, and at the intersection of Church and W. Franklin Street. Radius curving is the beveling of the curb corners to make turning easier.
