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



Work To Begin Soon On Durham, **Chapel Hill Road**

Work will begin soon on the long-awaited Durham-Chapel Hill highway, the State Highway Commission announced last week.

The Commission will receive bids on the grading and structures contract for the new highway at its November 28 letting in Raleigh. When completed, the project will provide a modern traffic facility for 8.35 miles at a new location between Franklin Street in Chapel Hill and University Drive in Durham and will not disturb traffic. on the old road.

Bids will be requested on 19 other projects. The total letting calls for improvements on 177.34 miles of roadway in 25 counties. By December 1, 1950 the Commission will have let to contract more than \$50,000,000 worth of highway projects during an 11month period. This more than doubles the contracts let during a similar period last year, according to Dr. Henry W. Jordan, Highway Commission. Chairman.
