

Approximately 2,000 dogs were vaccinated in the Health Department's program in 1949 while last year's vaccinations totalled only around 1,200 dogs, it was reported.

This year's campaign will get underway around April 1, in accordance with North Carolina state laws which require that all dogs over six months of age be vaccinated against rables each year in that month. A total of 2,768 dogs were listed for taxes last year, but this was estimated unofficially to be only about one half of the dogs actually in the county.
