Easy Hot Cross Buns Broadcast: March 10, 1951 /3 cups biscuit mix teaspoons sugar teaspoon cinnamon cup seedless 5 tablespoons /4 cup water 3 tablespoons be

Put into bowl biscuit mix, sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Stir in with fork a mixture of 4 tablesp, milk and the water. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead a few seconds or until smooth. Roll ½ in, thick. Cut into 8 rounds with floured 2½-in, cutter. With back of knife press a cross about half way through each round. Place close together in greased 8-in, round cake pan. Brush tops with rest of milk. Fill crosses with brown sugar. Bake in very hot oven (450) 15 min., or until brown.
